The accused took his seat with a calmness that was noticeable, and while he evinced a decided interest in the matters at issue, there was no look of fear upon his countenance, nor any evidence of nervousness in his action. Attorney W.H. Shoemaker, of counsel for the prisoner, asked for a postponement of the case for several days. His contention was that the defence was not prepared for trial; that no witnesses were present.
