Toronto, Feb. 25.—The receipts at the Union stockyards to-day were 135 cars, with 2,000 cattle, 147 calves, 1,330 hogs, 177 sheep and lambs and 104 horses. Trade was fair, with a good demand for choice butcher cattle at steady prices, but not any higher than last week. There were but few heavy choice steers offering, one small lot topping the market at \$6.90, which was 10c lower than last week's best price. A few lots sold around \$6.75, but the general run of choice heifers and steers did no better than \$6 to \$6.35. Choice fat butcher cows were steady from \$4.25 to \$5.25 and bulls steady from \$3.25 to \$4.25. Sheep and lambs were very strong at last week's best prices, with small offerings. Hogs were again in good demand, with a moderately light run, and the market 25c higher at \$9.25, fed and watered.

The Canadian Mail of Jan. 25th, speaking of Mr. John Farrell, of Forest, special emigration agent for the Ontario government, who is at present in Great Britain, says: "There is many a man who, before making up his mind that there is no room for him in the Old Country, has reached a state bordering on despair. Such a man cannot be told that he is going to make his fortune in Canada in six months. Figures and facts have lost meaning for him. What he needs is to regain confidence in himself, and to regain confidence he must find someone to believe in him. Would that all such men—and women, too—could find their way to Mr. John Farrell, the Special Agent of the Ontario Government. **Died at Victoria.**

Mary Agnes, youngest daughter of the late J. P. Miller, of Victoria, B.C., formerly of Sarnia, Ont., died very suddenly at St. Joseph's Hospital on Monday, Feb. 17th, of acute pneumonia. Deceased had been in very poor health while living in Sarnia, but was gaining and had every appearance of her health returning since going to the coast until she was taken very suddenly with pneumonia. She was a bright, amiable young woman and was highly thought of as a true friend by all who knew her and won many friends while living in Victoria who were grieved to hear of her passing from their midst. She leaves to mourn her loss two little sons, Orville M., aged 6, and Roy John, 2 years, also her mother, whom she had been living with since coming to Victoria last fall, and two sisters, Mrs. A. D. Williamson, of Watford, Ont., and Mrs. Alex. W. Alexander, also of Victoria. She was laid to rest beside her father, who had predeceased her only five months.
