ending—trade is more depressed than during the greatest sufferings. The tide of emigration for the United States has again set in, but few have the means to escape destitution.

A rupture had taken place between the English and Greek Governments, and a suspension of relations ensued; arising out of some old claims upon the Greek Government—and also in reference to some islands belonging to the Ionian group, which have been usurped by the Greek Government.

Data to the 22d state that four or five war vessels and cutters belonging to King Otto were captured by the English squadron, and that all Greek merchantmen were prohibited from leaving or entering their respective ports. It is reported that England has accepted the mediation of France in this affair, and that the French minister declared in private that he hopes to be able to announce in a few days that the misunderstanding between England and Greece has been amicably settled.

The steamer FALCON, reported as missing, has arrived at Halifax, having been detained for repairs.

The weather for the last fortnight has been changeable. One day cold, another followed by rain, which has melted nearly all the snow off our streets, making very bad sleighing. The weather within the last few days has been remarkably fine, and the "weather-wise" predict an early spring.

LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY.—The proceedings in the Legislature, since the 16th, have not been very interesting. On the 18th, the debate was continued on the consolidation of the laws relating to the government of Counties and Parishes. The Bill was sustained. On the 19th, a petition was presented by Mr. Earle for the incorporation of the Orange Lodges: an animated discussion followed, and resulted in the rejection of the Petition, on a large majority; many of the members, however, who voted to receive the Petition, declared they would oppose the Bill. A synopsis of the Attorney General's remarks will be found on our first page. On the 20th, the House was principally occupied in receiving Bills and Petitions. A Bill to incorporate Affron Lodge of Free Masons, passed the House. On the 21st, the House resolved into a Committee of Supply. A number of appropriations were made and sent to the Council. An outline of the debate will be found in our columns. On the 22d, several Bills passed the House. A Bill to authorize the Rev. Mr. Wishart, to solemnize Marriage passed, by the casting vote of the Chairman. The House being in committee on Ways and Means, the Revenue Bill then drew forth a short discussion, but the accounts and other matters were not before the House. Some of the Members were for adopting the Revenue Bill of last year, with a few alterations; and a select committee was appointed to frame a Bill, viz: Hon'bles Mr. Partlow, Montgomery, McLeod, Messrs. R. D. Wilnot, Brown, Sievers, and Ausley.

## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

SHIP ROCK OF SANDA LIGHT-HOUSE.

At the mouth of the Firth of Clyde.

THE Commissioners of the Northern Light-houses hereby give Notice, that a Light-house has been built upon the Rock called SHIP or SANDA, off the NEEL or KILRYRIE in the County of ARGYLL, the Light of which will be exhibited on the Night of Monday the 7th January, 1850, and every Night thereafter, from Sun set till Sun-rise.

The following is a Specification of the Light-house, and the appearance of the Light by Mr. ALAN TAYLORSON, Engineer to the Commissioners:—

The Light-house is in N. Lat. 55 deg. 16', min. 50 sec. and W. long. 5 deg. 34 min. 55 sec. By compass, the Light-house bears from Pidda Light, W. by S. 3-4 W. distant 18 miles; from Paterson's Rock Buoy, W. by N. distant 4-1-2 miles; from Adia Craig, N. W. by W. 1-8 W. distant 16 miles; from Corsewall Light, N. by W. 1-4 W. distant 22 miles; from the Maiden's Rocks Lights, N. E. 1-4 N. distant 21-1-2 miles; from Fair Head in the County Antrim, E. S. E. 1-4 E. distant 19-1-4 miles; from the most Northern point of Rathlin Island, S. E. by E. 1-8 E. distant 21 miles; and from the most Southern Point of the Mull of Kintyre, S. E. 3-4 E. distant 5 miles.

The Ship Rock of Sanda Light will be known to Mariners as a FIXED RED LIGHT. It will be visible in a south-westerly direction from N. W. 1-2 W. round to S. E. 1-2 E. The Lantern is elevated 165 feet above the level of the sea; but the Light being red, will not be seen at a greater distance than about five leagues; and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

The Commissioners hereby further give Notice, that by virtue of a Warrant from the QUEEN'S COURT, dated 1st March, 1849, the following Tolls will be levied in respect of this Light, viz:—

"For every Vessel belonging to the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland (the same not belonging to Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, or being navigated wholly in ballast,) and for every Foreign Vessel which by an Act of Parliament, Order in Council, Convention or Treaty shall be privileged to enter the Ports of the said United Kingdom upon paying the same duties of Tonnage as are paid by British Vessels (the same not being Vessels navigated wholly in ballast) which shall pass the said Light-house of Sanda, or derive benefit thereby, the Toll of one Farthing per Ton at the Buiden for every such Vessel for each time of passing the said Light-house, or deriving benefit thereby, on a coasting Voyage, and Double the said Toll for passing or deriving benefit on an Oversea Voyage; and Double the said respective Tolls for every Foreign Vessel not so privileged."
