China Replies.

Pekin, May 18.—The answer of China to the statement of the ministers of the foreign power as to the losses sustained by nations and individuals in China has been received. The answer commences with an appeal to mercy, saying that the country is impoveriahed. The answer explains that the utmost China can offer is 15,000,000 taels annually for the next thirty years. This amount will be derived as follows: From salt, 10,000, and from native customs, 3,000,000.
