### TO THE RATEPAYERS OF THE City of Toronto.

**LADIES AND GENTLEMEN—**  
On the first Monday in January you will be called on to select from among yourselves some one to succeed His Worship Mayor Clarke in the position he has so ably filled during the last two years.

Amongst the many names mentioned as possible candidates, my own has been freely used, and I have been repeatedly urged by my friends to publicly announce my intention of accepting a nomination.

In doing so now I will avoid any discussion of municipal questions, and simply confine myself at present to what may be considered my claims on your suffrages, and as I am not a candidate of any particular class, and if elected will not be elected to serve any special interest or section of the community, I can confidently appeal to all citizens for support, promising to work in the future, as I always have striven to do in the past, for the best interests of the ratepayers, and serve them honestly to the best of my ability, without fear or favour.

I have been for the past five years an alderman of the city, representing the ward of St. James. I have served two years as Chairman of the Legislative Committee, two years as Chairman of the Executive Committee, and have been for three months President of the Council during the Mayor's absence in England.

During the five years of my municipal career I have taken a leading part in all civic business, and have held the most important and responsible positions in the gift of my colleagues.

The experience I have gained during that time should be of some benefit to my fellow-citizens. My record as an alderman is before you, and will in some measure enable you to judge of my fitness for the position, and form an estimate of my ability to perform the duties devolving on the Chief Magistrate of the city.

In matters pertaining to the moral and social well-being of my fellow-men, I have all my life taken a deep interest, and have always been an active worker in the cause of moral and social reform.

In public and private I have not hesitated to uphold that which I thought right, and denounce what I considered wrong, regardless of consequences. I have done so conscientiously, and from a sense of duty; with my convictions had I done otherwise I would be unworthy of your confidence, and would assuredly have lost my own self-respect.

My course in the future will be as in the past. Prompted by the same motives, guided by the same principles, I will on all occasions when called upon in the discharge of duty, speak fearlessly, act justly, and "Hew to the lip, let the chips fall where they may."
