

Twenty-five persons, — seven tourists and eighteen guides, or porters,—have lost their lives on this mountain.

The most signal conquest of Mount Blanc was the establishment of a scientific observatory for the study of astronomy and meteorology upon its very summit. This was a work of great

found and sent to you. We have nothing to eat, my feet are already frozen, and I am exhausted: I have strength to write only a few words more. difficulty. All the material—much of it heavy iron framing—had to be carried up on the backs of sturdy porters. Then the snow and ice had to be excavated to the depth of many feet in order to find a foundation on the living rock.
