TRADE AND COMMERCE

VICTORIA.

The regular routine of business has been much broken into during the past week by the Celebration, but the trade have again settled down to business. The only feature of special note in the Market situation is another advance in Manitoba and Northwest Flours together with the strong tone of the wheat market. The weather has not been quite warm enough for the dry goods trade, who would experience a brisk trade in light goods with the rise of the thermometer.

The steamers of the Canadian Australian line will in future call at Auckland, N. Z., en-route to Sydney.

Nearly all the Coast Scaling fleet have returned to port to remain until the mid dle and end of June, when they will clear for Unalaska and enter Behring Sca at the end of the close season, Aug et 1. Hunting will then continue while the weather is favorable, generally from a month to six weeks. The small catches on the Coast make sealers very anxious about the Behring Sca catch.

DRY GOODS

Very marked advinces in prices on dry goods in general are reported from the large centres, while cottons and shirtings have advanced about 6 per cent, and will no doubt be higher before Fall.

Woolens are firm and the demand good, and owing to the higher prices paid for the raw wool during the past few weeks advice of the advance in prices of the manufactured articles may be looked for any day, in fact woolen yarns have already been advanced by some mills.

Kid gloves cannot be replaced at last season's quotations from the makers. The same applies to Bradford dress goods and woolen goods. Swiss muslins are in active demand and only obtainable from the makers at prices far in excess of the quotations of three months ago. So the advance in values is general both in the foreign and domestic markets, and although the rise in prices comes out of the consumer, it is the most satisfactory forerunner of a general improvement in business and the beginning of an end of the depression, under which the branches of trade have suffered for some time.

FRUITS AND VEGETABLES.

Apricots are now in the market and quoted at \$2 00 per case. New potatoes and new silverskin onions are in good supply, the former at 1½c per lb. and the latter at 1½c. Cherries are again lower. Strawberries are quoted at \$1.50 for crate of 15 baskets.

Washington berries are expected to be on the market in abundance shortly. Lemons are firm in price. The small fruit in local orchards is now well advanced and a bountiful crop is anticipated.

The meat market is steady — An Eastern exchange says that "advices to packers from their agents all over the country indicate an unusual demand for hams and bacon during the coming summer. It does not seem possible that the present low figures for these two prominent staples can continue very long."
