Would you address yourself to the question of whether there would be Canadian support for-necessarily-Military, or forceful means to keep Quebec in the Canadian Federation?

MINISTER LALONDE: We have taken a very strong stand in that respect: that we, as a Federal Government, would not resort to force to keep Quebec in, if the people of Quebec, in a substantial majority, were to decide that they don't want to be in. We would certainly resign as a Federal Government. I don't know what another Government would do, but you know, for us, it would be a political defeat of great substance and significance. It would mean that everything we fought for we have not succeeded in; and so, as a Government, we would certainly resign in a case like this.

But our commitment is not to resort to the use of force to keep Quebec in.

I don't know what another Government would do. That is, again, speculating on the future. But, again, this is speculating in the darkness of scenarios which I don't believe will happen.
