involved. We know very little of the crop as yet; as a matter of fact I do not think it is even in the blossom.

Mr. WRIGHT: Does this vote apply to any product other than apples?

Mr. GARDINER: That is all; apples.

Mr. STIRLING: Would the minister put on record the figures for British Columbia and Ontario?

Mr. GARDINER: The amount provided for British Columbia in 1943 was \$212,000, and this year that is reduced to the amount shown, \$50,000.

Mr. STIRLING: That is, \$50,000 less than that was required?

Mr. GARDINER: No; this item is \$162,500 less this year than it was last year; but the agreement with British Columbia has not yet been concluded, so that we do not know what will be involved in this year's contract.

Mr. STIRLING: But my recollection is that in the public accounts for 1942 the figure was about \$2,500,000 spent for Nova Scotia and something over \$250,000 for British Columbia, and I wondered whether we might have the comparable figures for 1943.

Mr. GARDINER: The appropriation for British Columbia in 1942 was \$1,000,000, but the expenditure was \$311,434.37. The appropriation for Nova Scotia was \$2,000,000; the expenditure was \$1,763,670.13, and there was a recovery of \$352,672.73. That is, the products were sold for that amount, so that the net cost was \$1,415,997.40. The net expenditure for British Columbia on the 1942 crop was \$212,500.

Mr. STIRLENG: Is the comparable figure for 1943 available?

Mr. GARDINER: No; the figure for 1943 is not yet available.

Mr. STIRLING: In the public accounts the allotment for Nova Scotia was just War Appropriation—Agriculture

over \$3,000,000, and the expenditure was just under \$2,500,000. For British Columbia the allotment was \$965,000, and the expenditure was \$261,000. Was that the figure the minister just gave?

Mr. GARDINER: The figure I gave was \$261,414.06.

Mr. STIRLING: And we cannot have the 1943 figures yet?

Mr. GARDINER: No.

Mr. JOHNSTON (Bow River): A moment ago the minister mentioned the agricultural income for all Canada. Could he break that down into the agricultural income for each province?

Mr. GARDINER: Yes, I have that here.

Mr. JOHNSTON (Bow River): Could the minister give the figures for the last eight or ten years?

Mr. GARDINER: I could put them on the record; they cover most of this sheet.

Mr. JOHNSTON (Bow River): I think it would be all right if the minister just gave the figures for last year and put the rest on the record.

Mr. GARDINER: The figures for 1943 were as follows:-
