Right Hon. L. S. St. Laurent (Prime Minister): I am sorry, but it will not be possible for me to go to Winnipeg this week. I think the announcements that will be made shortly as to what is to be done in connection with the whole situation will satisfy those who wish their sympathy expressed as vigorously as possible to the population that is so distressed in that area.

EFFECT OF DISASTER UPON RURAL AREAS

On the orders of the day:

Mr. George A. Drew (Leader of the Opposition): Following the observations that have been made with regard to the situation in Manitoba, and having regard to the statements that were made yesterday, may I suggest to the government that, in considering the things that must be done, full recognition be given to the extent of the disaster to the rural areas? While the tragedy and the destruction in Winnipeg is attracting attention through the necessity of protecting buildings there, there is also a heavy loss in the rural areas, in a considerable part of which crops will not be planted this year. I suggest that the government, in announcing its plans in regard to Winnipeg, also announce what is to be done for the rural areas that are affected.

Right Hon. L. S. St. Laurent (Prime Minister): The plans under consideration do not apply exclusively to Winnipeg; they apply to the whole area that has been affected by these disastrous floods.
