Questions

- 4. Can Indians obtain these forms for family allowances anywhere else than from the Indian agent and, if not, what act or regulation authorizes this restriction?
- Hon. A. J. MacEachen (Minister of National Health and Welfare): 1. In the large majority of cases applications for family allowances are made directly to the Department of National Health and Welfare. In the remainder, they are made through the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development.
- 2. The Indian bands whose members apply directly for family allowances to the Department of National Health and Welfare are those where this procedure has been recommended to the Department of National Health and Welfare by the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development. It is expected that all Indian bands will eventually be included in these arrangements. The other method has been retained for certain bands as a means of assistance to their members. Either method is permitted under the family allowances regulations.
- 3. The forms used by those Indians who apply for family allowances through the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development are different from those used by Indians who apply directly and by non-Indians. The colour is different so that they may be readily distinguished for administrative purposes. There are other minor differences to allow for the provision of certain identifying information such as the band name and number.
- 4. The forms described in 3 are available to Indians through the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development only. The reason is for the convenience of the Indians. The relevant authority is contained in the family allowances regulations.
