# POST OFFICE—DATA INPUT UNIT INSTALLATIONS

# Question No. 585-Mr. Macquarrie:

- 1. In what post offices were "data input units" (manufactured by Pylon Electronics Development Co.) installed?
- 2. How many such units were installed and at what total cost?
- 3. What other equipment or material was installed to make these units functional?
- 4. At what cost for material and installation?
- 5. For how long was the equipment in Parts (1) and (3) above used?
  - 6. For what reason was its use discontinued?
- 7. How does the function of "time clocks" in Canadian post offices differ from that in use before the installation of "data input units"?
- 8. What reasons prompted the introduction of "data input units"?

Hon. Eric W. Kierans (Postmaster General and Minister of Communications): 1. Toronto Post Office. These units were installed and maintained by Bell Canada.

- 2. (a) 77; (b) \$19,500 for wiring and cabling.
- 3. A central scanner which is an electronic scanning device which can poll up to 100 data input lines. Magnetic tapes required for the two tape drives which were used by the central scanner as data capturing devices.
- 4. Total cost for installation and material, \$41,333.67 (this includes the \$19,500 for 2 above).
- 5. From February 1968 until November 1969. It was a Pilot experiment necessary for the development of a future integrated Management Information System.
- 6. It was considered that information sufficient to establish the feasibility of using data input devices in a Post Office operation environment had been collected. Continuing the operation would have entailed unnecessary additional costs.
- 7. Prior to the advent of the input devices Toronto used a standard I.B.M. time clock which provided a visible printed record of the time clocked in. The data input device functioned manually, except that there was no visible record of the time a man clocked in or out, as this was captured (or relayed im-

mediately) to the central scanner and kept on magnetic tape. An employee determined a successful clocking by receiving a "Remove" light signal or, on an unsuccessful clocking, a "Reinsert" light signal on the input device.

8. The electronic data input devices were tested in the Pilot Project to examine the potential of a more immediate and accurate form of data collection (it did not have to be transposed to a machine readable electronic configuration). This data was then manipulated to prepare production control and personnel information reports.
