## CANADIAN ARMED FORCES—GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE

Question No. 1,057—**Mr. Forrestall:**

Are there any channels whereby a member of the Armed Forces can present or submit a grievance against his superior without going through his superior first?

**Hon. Donald S. Macdonald (Minister of National Defence):** Yes, the regulations provide that a member of the Canadian Forces may present a grievance to his Commanding Officer without first presenting it to his superior. If the superior against whom the complaint is made is the Commanding Officer, the complaint must first be made to him but if the latter does not forward the complaint to higher authority when requested to do so, it may be forwarded direct.

## PROVISION OF EMPLOYMENT FOR STUDENTS

**Mr. W. B. Nesbitt (Oxford):** Mr. Speaker, subject to your decision, I propose to ask leave to move the adjournment of the House for the purpose of discussing a specific and important matter requiring urgent consideration. The matter concerns the recognized unemployment crisis facing the students who will be coming out of our universities, colleges and high schools during the months of April, May and June. It is urgent that this matter be debated at once by the House in order to assist the government in establishing appropriate emergency measures to meet the problem.

If you agree, Mr. Speaker, that this matter is proper to be discussed, I shall ask leave of the House to move that this House do adjourn.

**Mr. Speaker:** The hon. member for Oxford has given the Chair due notice of his intention to request leave of the House to propose a motion under the terms of Standing Order 26 in order to discuss the question of unemployment facing students who will be coming out of our high schools, colleges and universities in the months of April, May and June. As the Chair stated on March 3 last when the hon. member for Oxford put forward a proposal somewhat similar to the one he now advances, the question of employment for students coming into the labour market has been before the House in various forms on several occasions in the current session. It may be said that unemployment in its many forms has been debated at length and voted upon in the present session.
