In concluding, Mr. Speaker, I would like to add that I have the firm conviction that with this injection of \$150 million Montreal will be able to further enhance its role as a centre of excellence for a variety of disciplines.

HUMAN RIGHTS

Mr. Dan Heap (Trinity—Spadina): Mr. Speaker, three days ago the national police of El Salvador kidnapped Jose Adolfo Rodas Rivera without a judicial order and are holding him in police headquarters, likely torturing him.

Rodas is a leader in the Christian Committee for the Displaced People, the group that has promoted the peaceful return of peasant families to war-torn areas of El Salvador.

The police are the force of the old military elite trying to block the peaceful return of democracy to El Salvador. With continuing United States' money and arms, El Salvador continues to drive some people to become refugees

Therefore, this is no time for Canada to begin dismantling our laws for giving shelter to refugees. We must not classify El Salvador as a safe country from which no real refugees come. We must not return Salvadorans to the United States without first examining their refugee claims, as Bill C-86 would allow us to do.

Instead, Canada should call on El Salvador to release Rodas unharmed, and on the United States to cease arming the Salvadoran security forces.

CANADA 125 CELEBRATIONS
