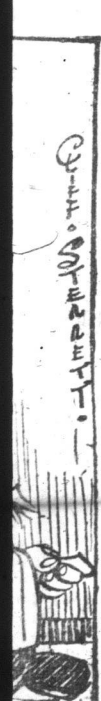

BULGARIA DEMANDS ALL OF MACEDONIA

Exorbitant Requests Made of
Quadruple Entente
Powers.

TREATING WITH TURKS

Endeavors to Secure Dedea-
gatch Railway and Strategic
Positions.

(Continued From Page 1.)

Bulgarian sources are made by political opponents of the government, who are using them among the people for internal political purposes. Now, as heretofore, the Bulgarian Government is guided by these three factors: First, non-acceptance of the treaty of Bucharest, which was not ratified by the national assembly, and which is not acceptable to Bulgaria so long as it remains unrevoked; secondly, the unwillingness of the Bulgarian people to engage in a war, the outcome of which is at all doubtful; third, the absolute necessity of convincing the Bulgarian people that whatever action is undertaken for a result to be achieved will be such that no betrayal afterwards will be possible.

No Change in Policy.
From other governmental sources it was learned that the Bulgarian Government and, it is declared, the Bulgarian people have in no wise modified the policy towards Macedonia, outlined in February last in a statement of the Associated Press by Premier Radoslavoff, when he declared that the domination of Macedonia by Serbia and Greece had produced results diametrically opposite to the principles for which Bulgaria had stood for many centuries, and that Bulgaria could not afford to remain heedless of the appeals of the Macedonians.

Wants All Macedonia.
Bulgaria, it is learned, wants all of Macedonia, and not only those parts made the subject of recent notes by the quadruple entente. Meanwhile the entente powers insist that Bulgaria earn these parts by making war upon Turkey, while the proposals of the central powers never went further than to assure the free passage through Bulgaria of materials needed by Turkey. It is agreed here that while the proposals of the entente would, if accepted, involve the shedding of Bulgarian blood against Turkey, those coming from the other side do not necessarily demand this from a nation still keenly mindful of its losses in the recent Balkan war.

LOSS OF ALEXANDRIA NOT CAPTAIN'S FAULT

Bloomfield Was Fully Justified in
Beaching Steamer Off
Scarboro.

MONTREAL, Sept. 3.—The master of the steamer Alexandria, Capt. William Bloomfield, was justified in his action in beaching his vessel, according to judgment given here this morning by Capt. L. A. Demers, Dominion wreck commissioner.

The Alexandria was lost in a hurricane off Scarboro Bluffs, near Toronto, Aug. 3. The master ran her on the beach and she went to pieces. The commissioner finds no fault with this action and exonerates everybody else in connection with it.

All blame for the accident to the steamship Roma in the St. Lawrence River on Aug. 16 is thrown on the pilot, Arthur Lechance, in the judgment of the Dominion Wreck Commissioner, Capt. L. A. Demers, which was given today. The pilot is fined \$100, for his "error of judgment."

CHANGE OF POLICY AT THE PARK.

Commencing Labor Day the management of the Park Theatre, Lansdowne avenue and Bloor street, will offer five high-class vaudeville acts and a variety of the latest photoplays, which will be shown for the first time in Toronto. Sweet, a charming contralto.

RECRUITING OFFICERS LOOKING FOR RECRUITS

Tent at Exhibition Doing Good
Work, But Actual Results
Hard to Estimate.

The recruiting officers are doing effective work on the Exhibition grounds. Color-Sergeant C. Fields, who is in charge of the work, said that better results were secured Thursday than on any other day of the fair. There are no facilities for attesting men at the recruiting tent north of the military camp, but intending recruits are given full information and are sent to the central recruiting depot at the armories to be medically examined. There are two sergeants from each of the eight city regiments who go through the grounds and single out the likely-looking men, giving them information about military service.

The results achieved yesterday were not as large as those of the previous day, but Sergeant Fields admitted that it was difficult to gauge the actual results as it was impossible to get the exact figures on account of all the men being enlisted through the central recruiting depot.

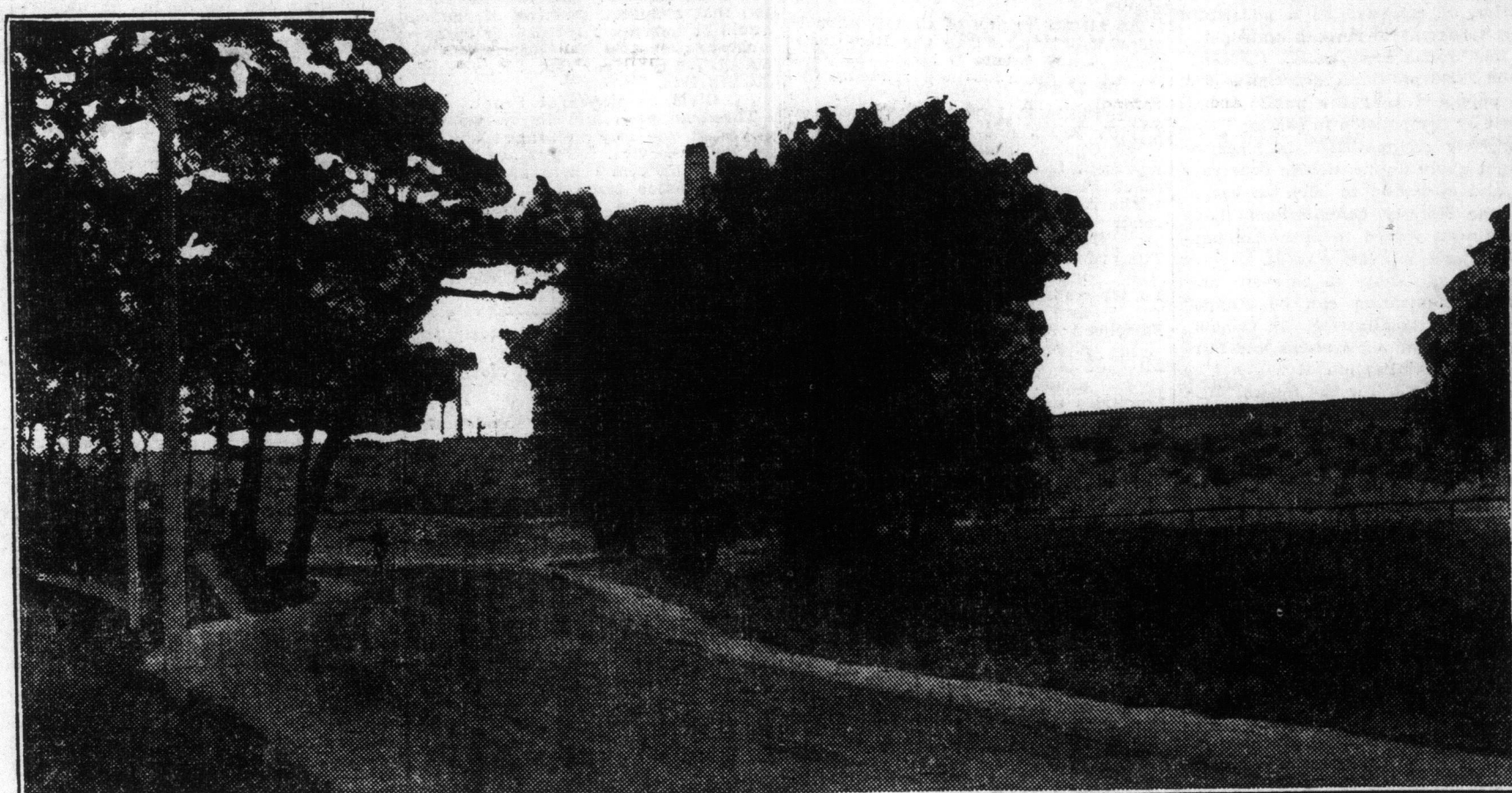

F. M. Burbridge, counsel for the ex-ministers, asked for a remand for one week, but this was opposed by R. A.

Bonnar for the crown. The remand for five days was then granted.

Further search for documents relating to the parliament buildings scandal was made by the police this morning in the office of Thomas Kelly & Sons. The open safe was guarded all night by constables, and shortly after 9 a.m. the search was resumed.

Roy Worthington, the firm's esti-

mator, was extremely indignant over the proceedings, and stated that he would seek advice as to the legality of the search.

Mr. Worthington has been subpoenaed to give evidence in the police court in connection with the hearing of the ex-ministers, together with W. A. Elliott, formerly government inspector on the parliament buildings.

CITY OF ROVERETO TAKEN BY ITALIANS

Gen. Cadorna's Forces Make
Headway in Drive
Toward Trent.

WAS LONG BESIEGED

Occupation of Trent Before
Winter is Now Fully
Expected.

ROME, Sept. 3.—In the capture of Rovereto the Italian forces have made notable progress in the advance upon Trent. Austrian troops began to evacuate the city yesterday and today it is being occupied by Gen. Cadorna's men. The Austrians have constructed barricades across the valley between Rovereto and Trent, military men here believe that Italian troops will approach Trent itself before winter halts military operations.

The City of Rovereto, lying 16 miles north of the Italian frontier, has been under long range bombardment for many weeks. The civil population of about 15,000 left early in June, but the garrison, occupying strong positions, continued its resistance until the movement of Italian troops thru the Val Sargana region and also from the west threatened their envelopment. The early evacuation of Riva, at the head of Lake Di Garda, by the Austrians, is expected to follow the fall of Rovereto.
