[This tract is a reprint of a discourse delivered at the dedication of the Unitarian Church in Montreal, Canada, on Sunday, May 11, 1645. It was an occasion of more than usual interest, from the fact that this was the first house of public worship in Canada, or in British America, devoted by name to the services of the Unitarian faith, and from the prosperity which had crowned the efforts of the congregation to secure for themselves a permanent administration of Christian truth. The house, neatly and durably built, and occupying one of the best situations in the city, bespeaks the healthful condition of the society by which it was creeted, and cannot but attract the notice of the stranger. It has been thought not improper that the allusions to the occasion on which the discourse was delivered should be retained in this tract.]
