

GRAND CIRCUIT MEETS IN NEW YORK NEXT WEEK

Dates Are to Be Arranged for 1912
Season—New York Should
Have a Meet.

NEW YORK, Jan. 1.—Followers of harness racing are looking forward to an interesting series of developments when the Grand Circuit hold their annual meeting at the Waldorf-Astoria on Tuesday of next week to allot dates for the coming season's racing. Overtures have been made by H. K. Devereux, the president, to bring the second annual meeting back into the fold, but whether the circuit will be picked up or the grandstand thrown down remains to be seen. Last year's successful meeting last year without membership in the circuit, and the association recently voted to go to it alone in 1912, as Lexington, Ky., has been doing for many years.

The embarrassing element in the situation is that if the seconders do not accept Mr. Devereux's cordial invitation and send a representative to next week's conference the stewards will have to face the task of forming a circuit with Columbus left out. It may be difficult to do with dignity, but coming the most important harness racing league in the world, it is a Lexington's October meeting is made a part of the circuit, as it probably will be by the new management, the stewards must fill a gap or leave one open just before Kentucky's great trotting season opens.

With wide open pool selling and bookmaking Columbus holds a strong hand in attracting the best horses, and it is not easy to find another association strong enough and brave enough to take the dates and give a meeting which clashes with that of the Ohio circuit.

At the November conference of the stewards, application was made for dates for a meeting this year at Salem, N.H., and there has lately been some talk of a meeting at Pittsburg, Pa., to follow the one at Cleveland, early in August. There is said to be a possibility, too, that a meeting may be held in New York, the conditions and the discouraging owing to the lack of co-operation or public spirit on the part of some of the wealthy men identified with trotting.

It is a sad commentary on the situation here that while New York breeders own nearly 300 of the 985 young trotters eligible to the Kentucky Futurity and have lately purchased the track at Lexington on which the race is to be decided, their own city, in which harness racing originated, and which is of far more importance to the future of trotting than Lexington ever has been or can be, is without a trotting track, and was without a Grand Circuit meeting in 1911.

Singularly enough, some of the men who purchased the Lexington track could not be induced to subscribe \$500 for a reserve fund to finance a Grand Circuit meeting in New York. A year ago after James Butler had given the free use of the Elmira track for the purpose and had it put in order at his own expense.

Nettie Ethon Takes Pace at Ice Meet In Straight Heats

A good attendance, extra good racing and any amount of it was the result of the last day of the Toronto Driving Club's winter meeting. It started off in not any too good shape as far as track conditions were concerned, but wound up in a blaze of glory. The track was one of the best and the time was good, as the summary will show.

The card for the wind-up day was the unfinished class race, the 2.30 pace and 2.12 pace. The first race called was the unfinished class race, with six starters. Little Fred had two heats, Little Dick one and Shaun Rhue one.

Promptly at 2 o'clock Starter McBride called them and with very little delay they were given the word. The trotter, Shaun Rhue, having the pole, trotted a beautiful mile, never lifting his nose and finishing like a stake horse in the fastest mile of the race. Little Dick was second and Little Fred third. Time 2:28.

The final heat was won just as easily. Shaun Rhue was never in doubt. He finished first, the other two contenders finishing as in the previous heat. Time of mile 2:27.

The next race called was the 2.30 pace, eleven entries and three heats. The first heat was the decided favorite. He drew the pole and held it safe for the first half, when he broke the lead. The fourth heat was also won by the favorite, Billy B., who had come to life and these two fought it all thru the stretch, but the burial man had it on him and landed first. Time 2:24.

In the fifth heat Billy B. had the pole before they were around the top turn, and made every post a winning one. The Undertaker second and Nellie Mack, who had revived and came from nowhere to finish third. Time 2:24. This race will be finished on Tuesday at 10 a.m.

The 2.12 pace had seven entries, five of which faced the issue. Furioso, 2:04, was the top heavy favorite from previous performances. Mattie Chimes drew the pole, with Lew Jean in second position. Chimes, after one or two scores they got the word and R. J. McBride, with his favorite, Nettie Ethon, who by the way was 3 to 1 in the betting, had the pole before the top turn was taken and say, she just paced perfect steps, made no mistakes and landed eased up, with the favorite second, Mattie Chimes third.

This proved possibly one of the most popular wins of the meeting. Nettie Ethon had been in hard luck in her other races at this meet, and Bob's many friends gave him an ovation on his return to the stand.

In the second heat she won quite as easily, with Lew Jean second, Furioso third. The final heat was won by Nettie, and she won just like a stake horse, the favorite, Furioso was second, Mattie Chimes third. Time of mile 2:21.

This concluded a very successful meet and it is doubtful if better racing will be seen anywhere this winter than at the closing day of the Toronto Driving Club's winter meet. The summary follows:
