A big broadside editorial opens thus The report of the Stanley committee of the house of representatives, which has been investigating the steel trust, has been the principal theme discussed here to-day in political and financial circles. Chairman Stanley reports against having the government regulate prices and wages, altho the steel company would not object to such legislation. He attempt to shore up the Sherman Act by a bill proposing many amendments to the act. These amend ments define many specific acts as proof of unlawful restraint of trade such as bribery of a competitor's emplove, selling below cost, contracting with customers not to sell to competitors, discriminating between customers, giving away goods or selling at slaughter prices to force competitors out of the field, controlling unduly raw material or machinery necessary to any business. Thus, for the steel commany to own 30 per cent, of the iron ore of the United States becomes, as a matter of law, a restaint of trade. Opens Door to Litigation.

NEW YORK, July 25.—(Special.)—

Oother provisions allow any state or individual to intervene in any suit for injunction or dissolution brought against an alleged trust by the federal government, either before or after judgment, and by cross-petition try out any claim for damages they may have against the trust. In all civil suits the burden of proof will be snift-ed so that the company will have to justify any restaintive trade as not being unreasonable.

Finally, upon a judgment dissolving the merger, all constituent companies may be forbidden to buy in the prop-erty of the trust, and, where the property of the dissolved merger is necessary for carriying on the business of competitors, the court may require the same to be sold in reasonable quantities at a price to be fixed by the court This clause would affect the United Shoe Machine Co., which can put any shoe manufacturer out of business, by withdrawing its machines from his

factory.
Other bills to be introduced forbid any steel company or coal company to own stock in a railway company, or for a railway company to own stock in them, and interlocking direct rates between such companies are forbidden.
