W.C.T.U. GIVES ROWELL ADVICE

More Discretion in Choice of Temperance Candidates Needed—Miss Wylie Snubbed.

RENEWAL, Nov. 1.—(Special)—A resolution brought before the Women's Christian Temperance Union Convention today was in effect a strong warning to N. W. Rowell, K.C., to use more discretion in his "abolish the bar" crusade.

"We deem it wise to sound a note of warning in connection with the East Middlesex contest, where one of the candidates is known to be so altered as to provide that the proprietor of a theatre when found guilty of putting on an inferior performance is liable to a fine of \$500 and imprisonment, loss of license to follow a second conviction."

Defended Rev. R. B. St. Clair. In dealing with the prosecution of Rev. R. B. St. Clair, it was recommended that the criminal code be so altered as to provide that the proprietor of a theatre when found guilty of putting on an inferior performance is liable to a fine of \$500 and imprisonment, loss of license to follow a second conviction.
