W.C.T.U. GIVES ROWELL ADVICE

More Discretion in Choice of Temperance Candidates Needed—Miss Wylie Snubbed.

REVIEW, Nov. 1.—(Special).—A resolution brought before the Women's Christian Temperance Union Convention by the resolutions committee today was in effect a strong warning to N. W. Rowell, K.C., to use more discretion in his "abolish the bar" crusade. In part the resolution said:

"We deem it wise to sound a note of warning in connection with the East Middlesex contest, where one of the candidates chosen was obnoxious to the temperance people, first, because of his personal habits, and secondly, because of his previous relationship to the temperance cause."

Therefore resolved, that if the Liberal party, as organized in the various constituencies, desires the support of the temperance people, it must not insult their intelligence and loyalty by candidates whose association with the bar, and whose past active hostility to measures of temperance reform, would render their pledges worthless to any sincere supporter of the temperance cause."

Defended Rev. R. B. St. Clair. In dealing with the prosecution of Rev. R. B. St. Clair, it was recommended that the criminal code be so altered as to provide that the proprietor of a theatre found guilty of putting on an indecent performance be liable to a fine of \$500 and imprisonment, loss of license to follow a second conviction.

In declining to act on the suggestion of Mrs. C. Cox, president of the Equal Suffrage Association of Ottawa, that Miss Wylie, English suffragette, address the delegates, a resolution was passed condemning militant tactics by suffragettes.

This Year's Gimcrack Winner. The two-year-old filly, winner of the famous Gimcrack Stakes recently at York, is like Zara II, who also won over the course earlier in the week, one of the first progeny of Massey to gain success this season. It is curious that before Filippant started his racing career, he was sold twice, and a 100 profit was turned over by his first owner when he became the property of Mr. Hulton. The colt was bred by Mr. Luscombe, and was put up for sale at the Newmarket first July sale. He was bought by Sir John Robinson for 770 guineas. Less than three months later Sir J. Robinson sent the colt to the Doncaster sales, and he passed into the ownership of Mr. Hulton for 1200 guineas. His success in the Gimcrack was worth 250. Mr. Hulton is experiencing phenomenal luck with the five four-figure youngsters, which he purchased at the blood-stock sales in England last year. Mr. Hulton bought a good many young ones, but the principal ones, for which he paid 750 guineas, were: Shotgun (200 guineas), Fairy King (170 guineas), Queen's Man (140 guineas), Flamingo (120 guineas), and Vert Galant (100 guineas). Vert Galant has not yet won a race, but with the other four Mr. Hulton has won nine races worth 1713. Shotgun has netted 445. Mr. Hulton won the Gimcrack last year with the Derby and Ebor championships at Epsom and Ascot had been disqualified.

New Organization Will Have Its Head Office in Toronto.

The Canadian Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals and the Establishment of Animal Shelters is the title of an organization which has just been incorporated by the Ontario Government. Its headquarters will be in Toronto. The provisional directors are Edith Skeels, Jessie Fraser Ferguson and May Bryson Converse Smith, all of Toronto.

The society is organized for the following purposes: "To establish and maintain pounds, shelters, homes and hospitals for domestic animals; and to rescue animals from starvation and ill-treatment; to provide effective means for the prevention of cruelty to animals, fish, fowl and reptiles; and to enforce laws which now are or may hereafter be enacted for the prevention of cruelty to animals, and to secure the arrest, conviction and punishment of any person or persons violating such laws."

Obtaining Gasoline From Natural Gas. The increasing demand for gasoline and the difficulty experienced in meeting this demand with the product of the oil refineries, lend great interest to this commodity, a method of producing this commodity, states C. F. Hirsch, in The Engineering Magazine. Such an alternative method has acquired considerable prominence during the past few years.

The process referred to results in the production of gasoline from what is called combustible gaseous material arising from wells in oil and gas regions.

Little, if any, gasoline can be recovered from dry gas; comparatively large quantities can be obtained from the heavier varieties.

The plant required for the recovery of gasoline from gases of this kind is very simple and comparatively inexpensive.

Several distinctly different methods might be used, each involving characteristic apparatus. At present, however, there is practically only one method and type of plant in use.

This apparatus is merely a simple condenser in which the gaseous material is to be treated for pipe line transmission. Indeed, the process is merely an outgrowth of such preparation. It was often observed that a liquid drained out of natural gas lines, particularly when the pressure was high and the temperature happened to be low. When investigation showed this liquid to be a high-grade gasoline, little further incentive was required to bring about the perfection and commercialization of the process.

Experience has shown that as many as eight to nine gallons of high-grade gasoline can be obtained per thousand cubic feet of heavy gas when subjected to gravity in the neighborhood of 11 degrees to 12 degrees Fahrenheit.
