### AN ENGLISHMAN ARRESTED KNOWN AS COMPANION OF BOMB THROWER

Morales, Missing Suspect, Had Plenty of Money and Laid Plans Thoroly -Tragedy Casts Damper on Celebration.

Madrid, June 1.—The magnitude of the attempt on the lives of King Alfonso and Queen Victoria increases. The number killed is now given at 20 and the wounded at 60. During the night thirty arrests were made.

The ministry has decided to continue the fetes for the purpose of allaying public apprehension. Queen Victoria is irreconcilable, declaring that she is responsible for so many persons being killed.

King Alfonso had even a more miraculous escape than is generally known. A fragment of the bomb struck his breast, but the force was broken by the chain of the Portuguese Order of Santi-

# LEITCH, K.C., OF CORNWALL APPOINTED CHAIRMAN OF RAILWAY BOARD

Announcement Made Known Last Evening and Puts an End to a Problematical Topic-A Deserving Tribute.

Cornwall, June 1.-James Leitch, K. C., of Cornwell, to-night received notice of his appointment as chairman of the railway and municipal board for Ontario, at a salary of \$6000 a year. This is the new board brought into existence by ar act of the late session

of the Ontario government. Mr. Leitch was admitted to the Law Society as a student-at-law in 1871. He read law for one year with the late James Bethune, Q.C., and finished his law course with the firm of Crooks. James Bethune, Q.C., and imished his law course with the firm of Crooks, kingsmill & Cautanach of Toronto. He was called to the bar in the Easter term, 1876, and at once commenced plactice in Cornwall. During that year he became associated with R. B. Carman, now seniir judge of Lincoln County, the firm being Carman & Leitch. This partnership continued until 1883, when Mr. Carman was appointed to the bench and Mr. Leitch associated with him R. A. Pringle, M. P., the firm being Leitch & Pringle, Mr. Leitch was appointed a Queen's counsel by the Barl of Derby in 1889. His present firm, Leitch, Pringle & Cameron, has an extensive practice and represents several large corporations, including the Canadian Colored Cotton Mills Co., Cornwall Paper Co., the Ontario Bank and several municipal corporations.
