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Stocks on London  
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CHICAGO GRAIN & OPTIONS  
MAKE NEW LOW LEVELS

Trend of Grain Futures Still To-  
wards Easier Prices—Liver-  
pool Also Lower.

Saturday Evening, July 28.  
Liverpool wheat futures closed to-day  
1/4d lower.  
At Chicago July wheat closed 1/4c lower  
than Friday; July corn, 1/4c lower, and July  
oats 1/4c lower.  
Chicago car lots to-day: Wheat 150, con-  
tract 500; corn 100; oats 140, 60.  
Northwest car to-day 725; last week 614,  
last year 598.  
Primary receipts wheat to-day, 1,242,000;  
shipments 380,000; last week, 1,104,000.  
Corn to-day, 345,000; 561,000; last week, 419,000;  
60,000; last year, 470, 385, 383.  
Australian wheat shipments: This week,  
308,000; last week, 288,000; last year, 280,  
600.  
Indian wheat, 1,280,000, 1,120,000,  
1,250,000.

ST. LAWRENCE MARKET.

Receipts of farm produce were 20 loads  
of hay, 10 loads of potatoes, and a large  
basket market of butter, eggs and poultry.  
Hay is usual on Saturday there was a  
large number of visitors and buyers at the  
farmers' basket market and at the butcher  
and stalls.  
Hay—Twenty loads sold at \$14 to \$15  
per ton for old timothy, and \$9 to \$10 for  
new.

Potatoes—Ten to fifteen loads of pota-  
toes were brought in by farmers and market  
gardeners, which sold at 70c to 80c per  
bushel. J. Ryan, one of the largest  
wholesale dealers, bought over 300 bushels  
at the above prices.  
Butter—Deliveries were large. Select lots  
of dairy to special customers sold at 24c  
to 25c, but not any higher and there were  
few farmers got these prices, the bulk sell-  
ing from 22c to 23c per lb., and some lots  
as low as 20c.  
Eggs—New-laid eggs, as is always the  
case in harvest time, when farm yard hens  
get all the grain they can eat, were more  
plentiful, and for farmers got the highest  
price, 22c per dozen, as they were slow  
at that price, the bulk selling at 22c  
and some held eggs sold at 20c to  
21c per dozen.

Poultry—Deliveries of spring ducks and  
spring chickens were equal to the demand.  
Ducks sold at 10c to 12c per lb., early in  
the morning for prime lots, but later in  
the day prices dropped to 10c and some  
were offered to the butchers as low as 9c  
per lb. Chickens sold at 14c to 16c per lb.  
for the bulk of offerings, but there may  
have been a few extra large pairs that  
sold as high as 18c to 20c, but these were  
the exception and not the rule. Fine  
chickens of last week sold at 10c to 12c  
and 12c and 13c per lb. Turkeys, 14c to 16c  
per lb.

Market Notes.  
R. Barron & Son, Park, Thompson &  
Co., John Patterson for Swan Bros., and  
McLennan were the heaviest buyers of  
choice poultry.  
Brown Bros. the St. Lawrence butchers,  
got 25 pairs spring chickens, averaging 8  
lb. per pair, at 12c per lb. Three prime  
quality new milk fed calves at 95c per  
lb. dressed weight.  
Mr. P. Mallon, the wholesale dealer in  
poultry, reports the supply as not being  
very heavy during the past week, but quite  
equal to the demand. Mr. Mallon is in-  
creasing his place of business, which,  
when completed, will be up-to-date in every  
detail, and he expects to do a large  
trade than ever. Mr. Mallon stated that  
his total sales last week would not reach  
150 pairs all told, but that the number of  
farmers buying, and many people out  
of town, are some reasons for this state  
of the trade.

John Abate, the largest retail fruit de-  
aler at the butchers' market, reports doing  
a fair trade, but choice fruit scarce and  
very dear to buy.  
George Puddy of Puddy Bros., reports all  
kinds of prime quality meats as being  
scarce and high in price, but thinks the  
prices of live hogs will be lower this com-  
ing week.

W. Carter & Co., 85 East Front-street,  
reports prices for wool and hides as being  
easy at quotations given below. Mr. Car-  
ter reports large quantities of wool as  
being offered at country points, much of  
which has been offered to them, and some  
can be expected quarters.
