Another development of the becoming round yoke style of waist is shown in this pretty model, made of lavender mull and Venice all-over lace. It is also an extremely good model for pongee and if developed in pale-green pongee with black velvet and German Veil, it would be remarkably satisfactory.
The pattern is in 6 sizes—32 to 42 inches, bust measure. For 36 bust, the waist will need 4 1/2 yards of material 20 inches wide, or 2 1/2 yards 36 inches wide, or 2 1/4 yards 42 inches wide. As illustrated, 1 1/4 yards of all-over lace 18 inches wide is needed for collar, yokes and bertha, and 2 1/4 yards of ribbon to trim.
