CONSOLS ON UNITED STATES MARKET.

Liverpool Post Says it is Fraught With Immense Financial and Economic Significance.

London, April 23.—Applications for the new loan continue to pour into the Bank of England. The subscribers to the loan are, for the most part, the same as in the case of the last loan.

It is estimated that the loan was subscribed for six or seven times over, and it is expected the list will be closed to-morrow, as it is not desired to lock up too much money.

RECRUITS LIKE SHOW.

Total Enrollment in Imperial Corps for 1900 Was 98,281.

London, April 23.—The annual return of recruiting for 1900 shows a total enlistment of 98,281, against 42,790 in 1899. The recruiting for the infantry is reported as unsatisfactory. In spite of the impetuosity of the war and the reduction in the standard of height, the number of enlisted infantrymen is below that of 1899, the recruits generally having preferred the shorter branches of the service.

SUSPECTED TILL-TAPPERS.

Three of the lads remained outside to watch the movements of the storekeeper, while the fourth went in to rob the till. Fortunately, there was a well attached to the cash drawer, which rang when it was opened, and the sound attracted the attention of a clerk who was in the rear of the store. The thieves then ran away without securing anything for their theft, and pursued some distance by the clerk, who ultimately gave up the chase.
