### TO PUNISH PERSONATORS PURPOSE OF NEW MEASURE

MacDiarmid of West Elgin Introduces Bill in Legislature to Amend Election Act.

The legislature sat half an hour yesterday. Only one bill was introduced. It is an amendment to the Election Act by Mr. MacDiarmid of West Elgin. Its main provisions are: To designate persons from appointment as election officials who have ever been reported or found guilty of corrupt or illegal acts at elections; to extend the provisions of the Personator Act so as to give jurisdiction to county and district judges to issue warrants or summonses and to try persons arrested or prosecuted under that act; to extend the act to all municipalities and unorganized territory in the province; to give jurisdiction to county and district judges in prosecutions for corrupt practices under the election laws, the defendant to have the right to elect to be committed for trial before a High Court judge without a jury.

**Registrar of Huron.**  
Mr. Ellber moved for a return of correspondence in connection with the appointment of William Coats as registrar of Huron. It was well known, said Mr. Ellber, that the office was kept vacant for four and a half years and it had been said that there were dozens of people who had been promised the appointment. This office had been held over the Speaker's head for the past two elections. He quoted from the Huron Expositor, which said that the appointment was the "ranked and rottenest" that had ever been perpetrated in Ontario. It was a direct slap in the face to many Liberals, and he understood their motive if they didn't object.

The Attorney-General said it was about a year ago since hon. gentlemen called attention to the length of time this registrarship had been vacant, and he (Mr. Gibson) called attention to the fact that in counties where there were three constituencies it was difficult to make a choice. It often happened that when there were conflicting interests it was hard to satisfy all. It was not without saving, and he did not try to make a choice in many cases. That was the case in Huron. There were any number of good men in the County of Huron and it was not to be supposed that they would all settle on the same proper person for the appointment. He was pleased that Mr. Ellber had no criticism of the appointment, and on the whole he did not think there would be any complaint. It was not the case that promises had been made to a number of applicants. It was not expected that any private correspondence of this connection would be brought down, altho he did not know that there was anything to be afraid of.

Mr. Ellber said three years ago he asked when the appointment would be made, and he was told it would be made forthwith, and last session he asked the same question.

### SUGAR MAKING ON SUNDAY.

**Lord's Day Alliance Prosecutes a Case in Berlin, Ont.**  
Berlin, Feb. 12.—The charge laid by the Lord's Day Alliance over a year ago against some workmen of the Ontario Sugar Company, for unlawfully working on Sabbaths, was continued here today, before Magistrate Weir. E. A. O'Meara of Toronto appeared in case for the Lord's Day people and Alex. Miller of Berlin for the defendants. The evidence of Superintendent Bell of the Ontario Sugar Company and his assistants was to the effect that it was absolutely necessary to operate the factory on Sunday, as the syrup would sour and deteriorate during the 24 hours' cessation, besides there is other work necessary to be done the preceding day for the day following. In fact, it was a hurried every minute from the beginning to the close of the season.

For the defence, Mr. Dowie of Montreal was called. He testified that he had been a sugar refiner and engineer and a designer of sugar factories. His reputation, as given by himself, for 15 years in a refinery in Scotland, three years manager of a cane sugar factory in Calcutta two seasons in the Hawaiian Islands and ten years in a refinery in Halifax. His evidence was to the effect that it was absolutely necessary to operate a sugar beet plant. He thought 12 hours would accomplish the making of sugar from the time the beets were put in and maintained that syrup could be kept 24 hours without souring, but without discoloring. He said it was therefore not necessary to operate a sugar beet factory on Sunday. Mr. Miller, counsel for defendants, invited Mr. Dowie to inspect the Berlin factory. This invitation was graciously accepted, and an adjournment was made for Feb. 21, where the extension is to be resumed of the court.

### MEMORIAL TO DR. SANGSTER.

**Former Pupils Propose to Erect a Bronze Tablet.**  
A meeting of former pupils was held yesterday in the Normal School, to consider a memorial to the late Dr. Sangster. It was decided to request the Ontario Educational Association at Exeter to have a tablet erected on the wall of the school, to be inscribed with the names of the pupils of the late Dr. Sangster. A committee consisting of J. L. Hughes, William Scott, principal, J. P. Martin and W. J. Conroy, will wait on the government and secure permission to erect a bronze tablet in the school to the memory of Dr. Sangster, and the suggestion was made that pupils of the late Dr. Sangster, Kirkland, Davies and Robertson should undertake similar movements. Principal Scott was appointed treasurer.

### ONTARIO FISHERIES.

Ottawa, Feb. 12.—A revised draft of suggested fishery regulations from the Deputy Commissioner of Fisheries of Ontario has been in the hands of the Dominion Commissioner, who has approved of a number of them. Those which have been approved, confer Dominion authority upon provincial fishery law, a minimum penalty of \$10 has been fixed for fines for violation of fishery law, the maximum penalty of \$100. Owners of private ponds must obey the regulations. All fishing in certain fish are recommended, fish under such size are to be replanted in the water.

### AGAINST JOURNEMEN PLUMBERS.

Chelmsford, Feb. 12.—Judge Hossa of the Superior Court today made perpetual a temporary injunction against the Journeymen Plumbers Association and the Building Trades Council, forbidding them to interfere by patrolling, intimidation or persuasion with the employees of master plumbers. This is a case where a strike was ordered by way of discipline to compel the payment of dues to a union.

### Swore There Was a White Light.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Feb. 12.—Preston Moon of the westbound Pere Marquette train, which crashed into a heavily loaded eastbound passenger train at East Paris, Dec. 20, 22 persons being killed, testified at the inquest today with great positiveness that there was a white light seen at McCorn's Station when his train rushed by the night of the wreck.
