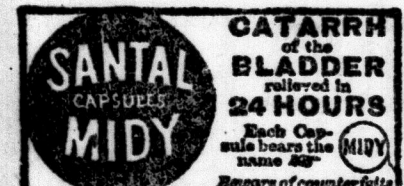

FRANK CAHILL FOUND GUILTY OF ROBBERY; STRONG IS CONVICTED

Two Youths Have Convictions of Attempted Theft Registered Against Them.

FRANK LEWIS IS FINED

Admits Attacking Charles Hoskins—None of Prisoners Sentenced Yet.

Frank Cahill, charged with the theft of a ring from a fellow-celebrator in a North London house last September, was yesterday afternoon found guilty of robbery, the conviction being upon the second of three counts preferred against him. Evidence was given by the man who lost the ring that during his debauch he remembered Cahill trying to take the ring off his finger. The ring was not recovered by the police, but Cahill was found at his arrest to be in possession of a considerable sum of money.

Theodore Sharman and Leighton Rumball were found guilty of attempting to steal the automobile of John Gilbert, which the owner had left parked on the market square. The prisoners explained that they mistook the car for one belonging to a Windsor friend of theirs. Rumball testified that he was employed by the National Cash Register Company in Detroit and was waiting for you at the corner of York and Ridout street," asked Judge Macbeth.

"If they had, would any policeman in London have taken the trouble to find out if their story was true?" asked J. Macbeth.

The story of the two youths was that Moffatt had some whiskey and they were going to meet him at a quiet street corner where they could safely drink. He had told them to bring his car from the market square while he went to get the bottle.

Vincent Strong was found guilty on one more count, housebreaking and theft from the home of Frank Hornsby, 608 Maitland street. According to the evidence in Strong's three trials at this session of the county court, he must have been preparing to start a second-hand clothing store. He also took a lot of money, \$1.35 in American silver, which Mr. Hornsby's wife was saving up.

Charles Lewis having pleaded guilty to common assault for attacking Charles Hoskins, street railway inspector, was fined \$50. The criminal court was closed last night, but none of the convicted prisoners have been sentenced yet.

MISS CLOIS TERRY HEARD IN RECITAL BEFORE FULL HOUSE

Demonstrates Remarkable Progress Made During Past Year—Voice Delightfully Musical, True.

A full house greeted Miss Clois Terry when she appeared in recital last night at the Masonic Temple. A pupil of E. J. Macbeth, the recital was a most interesting one. Miss Terry demonstrated that she has made remarkable progress during the past year. Her voice, delightfully musical and true, of a light soprano quality, was heard exceptionally well in Ross's "The Star" and "The Birth of Mary" (Leon), the last number with its final refrain, "The Rugged Road," rendered beautifully. Another very fine number was "The Rugged Road," which she accompanied with the piano. Miss Terry, who acted as accompanist, shared the honors with the singer, the number being her own composition. It is a lovely piece of lyric music, with pretty cadence and harmonies vibrant with feeling. Artistic Touch Noticeable. The biggest numbers of the evening were placed at the beginning of the program, the "Jewel Song" from Gounod's "Faust," and "Madame Butterfly's Song" from Puccini's opera. These were rendered with an artistic touch, which was noticeable throughout the entire evening's recital. Two groups of little songs included "The Cuckoo" and "Daddy's Sweetheart" (Liza Lehman), and two lullabies by Brahms, "The Lullaby" and "Lullaby for the Mother." The number of all "Farewell to Summer" (Noel Johnson), was a fitting climax to so fine a vocal program.

Miss Terry was assisted by Miss Doris Watts, a piano pupil of Charles E. Percy. Although Miss Watts was heard in but two numbers of Wienias's "Valse de Concert" and Chopin's "Herzegovine," from Opus 57, she demonstrated her brilliancy as a pianist. PACKED AUDIENCE AT MAJESTIC IS WELL PLEASED WITH SHOW

Presentation of "Baby Mine" Increases Company's Popularity in London.

Filled from beginning to end with fun and laughter Margaret Mayo's farce comedy, "Baby Mine," presented at the Majestic Theatre for the first time last night by the Majestic Players stock company was delightfully staged and sent the packed audience away satisfied that London has in this company no mere aggregation of players just putting in the winter months but a number of really clever actors.

Miss Genevieve Fatta as Zoie, the wife of Alfred Hardy, a businessman, portrayed by G. V. Dill, who has contracted a fit of jealousy as the result of a rumored visit of his wife to a restaurant with another man sustains the role of the misjudged wife in the first act with a fidelity to hysterical excitement seldom found in such plays. As a means of regaining her husband's love Zoie accepts the advice of her bosom friend Aggie, the wife of her husband's great chum Jimmy Jinks, and decides to adopt a baby and then send word to her husband undertakes to aid in the deception and is sent to fetch the child of a mother who has agreed to part with it; how in the meantime the mother repents her bargain, and he has to take the child by stealth, and how the two babies of a laudable are brought into the plot, also with Jimmy's aid, add to the general mix-up.

The first act takes place in Zoie's sitting-room on an autumn morning; act two in Zoie's bedroom three months later, and act three in the same room on the same night.

The company will present the same play each night during the remainder of the week with matinees on Wednesday and Saturday, and the brilliant playing of last night will, as one friend tells another, assure the company a continuance of the full house which witnessed last night's play with such great enjoyment that several curtains were demanded.

EDUCATING WORKERS ASSOCIATION OBJECT; CLASSES INCREASING

British Government Votes Money To Aid This Special Work, Declares.

In Professor J. A. Dale's speech to a large and enthusiastic audience at St. Andrew's Hall last evening on the subject of the "Workers' Association Educational Movement," he confined the attention of his audience to the wonderful advantages the movement has wrought in Great Britain. Professor Dale is of the social service department of the Toronto University and has had a wide experience in this movement throughout England.

The sole object of the association is to educate the people who have been unfortunate in not securing an educational training during their childhood. The teachers of the colleges and universities in the countries where the association has been established have taught the pupils, and some good results have been shown. Teaching is not only confined to the urban districts, but extends to the rural ones as well.

The speaker dealt chiefly with the self-tutored classes. The students of these classes meet to discuss different educational points. A greater realization of educational advantages has been achieved through this method than could be expected when the teachers enlighten them by lectures.

"This movement in England has met with the greatest of success," he said. "Before the war there were about 200 classes of from fifteen to thirty in each class, but now there are over 10,000 men and women taking advantage of the courses. The courses last from one year to three years, depending on the course the student wishes to take."

What has this movement done for the country? Graduates have been elected to the cabinet of the country, while others have governed municipal affairs. A great difficulty experienced in that of securing efficient books Libraries in the old country buy books

and these are released to the students in relation to the courses they are taking. The different trades unions and universities set aside a certain amount of money each year for the carrying out of the scheme, but later when it was becoming a country-wide movement, the Government recognized the importance of it and voted a certain sum to help carry it out.

Started in Canada. "With nearly all of England interested in this, the movement spread to Australia, where it now has a good footing and is meeting with great success. Later signs that it was needed in Canada were shown and in Toronto today there are over 100 men and women taking courses. The employers of the men and women have lately shown that they are also interested and have allotted money to carry out the work," he concluded.

At the conclusion of his address he answered several questions from the audience on the advantages and difficulties that would be met with if a branch of the association was started in London. Whether a branch of the association will be launched in London remains to be seen.
