Note and Comment

The Toronto cricketers played rag with the googly bowling of Horden yesterday, butting him like the rest of the pilgrims, all over the Varsity lot, and but for the late start the Zingari would have surely scored a win over the strongest team seen from the other side this year. The result is a draw, greatly in favor of the residents, who required only 38 runs to win, but unfortunately had but 20 minutes left, not enough time to turn the trick.

B. J. T. Bosanquet, one of the present best known English gentlemen cricketers, was the original googly performer, the delivery being obtained by a New Zealander after playing the bowling.

Turf Star was the best 2-year-old on the Canadian turf, and by her racing efforts earned top weights in all the handicaps, and her first start in the east yesterday, when she won the last race at Sheepshead Bay, demonstrated that the official handicapper had a correct line on the filly.

Charles Rowell, at one time the greatest six-day go-as-you-please runner in the world, is dead at Cambridge, England. For several years, way back in the eighties, Rowell was invincible in six-day contests on the savannah track. He won several big purses over the years, and his last race was in New York City. At one time Rowell held practically all the records from 100 to 1000 miles, and his records for 100 miles (23 hours 25 minutes 23 seconds) and 200 miles (48 hours 17 minutes 5 seconds) are still the premier marks. In 1881 Rowell was beaten in a six-day race by F. Fitzgerald. It is the most gruelling contest ever seen on the savannah path. Fitzgerald gradually overhauled Rowell in the last 24 hours of the race, catching the champion but one hour before the finish. A huge sum of money changed hands on the result, and the contest ended, becoming a well-to-do hotelkeeper in England.
