AGAIN OXFORD'S YEAR WINS ANNUAL BOAT RACE

Cambridge Makes the Usual Game Struggle From Putney to Mortlake.

PUTNEY, Eng., March 23.—The Oxford crew won the championship eight-oared boat race with Cambridge today by three and a half lengths in 21 minutes 14 seconds, official margin and time.

Oxford rowed true to form to-day, and won the 6th struggle easily on the official course from Putney to Mortlake, a distance of 6 1/2 miles, and after the slight advantage they had in the first mile as to the result. At the first the lighter Cambridge men were a quarter of a length ahead, but they had shot their bolt in this early start and began dropping behind.

At Mortlake there was in many respects a repetition of last year's struggle. Oxford was a hot favorite.

One of the greatest crowds that ever lined the Thames witnessed the struggle. The dark blue of Oxford was largely in the ascendant, as the Oxfonians, confident that their crew would win, poured out in larger numbers than the Cambridge supporters.

Cambridge won the tow and chose the Middlesex side of the river, getting what slight advantage there was from the wind. The Oxford boat had the Surrey side. The wind was not enough, however, to rough the water, which was another advantage to the Cantabs, as their lighter crew would have been at a disadvantage in rough water. The average weight of the crews was: Oxford, 176 1/2; Cambridge, 172 1/2.

The start was made at 12.27. Cambridge immediately began using a stroke of 36 to Oxford's 35, which sent the light blue boat slightly in the lead. Oxford, taking things easy, permitted this lead to be maintained throughout the first mile, when the Cantabs seemed to tire.

At Hammermill's Bridge, one-third of the distance to the finish, Oxford was leading by 2 1/4 of a length, and her supporters knew that nothing but an accident could rob her of the race. So sure was Oxford of the result, that just before the start of the race, Cambridge clung desperately to her initial stroke.

Cambridge made her final spurt near the half-way point, when she succeeded in cutting down Oxford's lead of 1 1/4 to one-half length. The effort told on the light blue, however, for between the half-way point and the 5 1/4 mile mark she steadily away and increased her lead to 2 1/2 lengths.

Cambridge rowed a game race in the face of defeat, and in the last mile of the race lost only 1/4 of a length.

The Oxford crew was a far stronger one physically than the Cambridge men. The Cantabs looked as if they had been overworked. Their stroke, Rhinels, was of his own, which compared most unfavorably with the effective swing of the Oxford crew. Captain Bourne, most speculators thought that Captain Williams, who pulled No. 5, should have stroked the Cambridge boat.
