

# FINE GREENING APPLES ON MARKET YESTERDAY

Choicest of the Season Arrived  
at Wholesale From  
Hamilton.

## FLORIDA CELERY CHEAPER

Another Decline in Prices of  
Strawberries and Navel  
Oranges.

Navel oranges again declined on the  
wholesales yesterday, and sold at \$2.50  
to \$3.50 per case.

Some of the choicest greening apples  
seen on the market this season came in  
yesterday, McBride Bros. having a car  
from Dixon Bros. of Hamilton, which  
sold at \$5 per box.

Florida celery is cheaper and now  
sells at \$3.50 to \$3.75 per case.

Florida strawberries also declined, sell-  
ing at 30c to 35c per box. The low  
grade, which has been the main item  
in the market, is selling at 25c to 30c  
per box. A car of Florida celery,  
selling at \$3.75 to \$4.25 per six-  
bushel crate, and a car of Florida celery,  
selling at \$3.50 per bushel, were  
also on the market.

Strawberries, the Golden Seed brand,  
coming in, are selling at 12c to 15c  
per bushel, and the same brand, coming  
in, are selling at 10c to 12c per bushel.

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# SOFT WEATHER HURT STOCK YARDS' TRADE

Mild Temperature and Conges-  
tion of Market Caused De-  
cline in Prices.

## MILKERS OF POOR QUALITY

Stockers and Feeders Held Their  
Own Yesterday as Demand  
Was Good.

Receipts of live stock at the Union  
Stock Yards on Thursday were 78 car-  
loads, comprising 883 cattle, 1613 hogs,  
108 sheep and lambs, 42 calves and 547  
horses.

"Butcher" cattle—it would have been  
better for trade had there been no fresh  
cattle on the market during the week  
ending last Friday, as the market was  
not so good as it was on the previous day.

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# UNCERTAINTY FELT IN MINING MARKET

This Feeling Caused Irregularity  
in Trading—Dome Exten-  
sion Advanced.

The penicky liquidation which  
characterized the mining stock market on  
Wednesday following the finance min-  
ister's budget was absent from the  
market yesterday, but there was no  
decided rally in the stocks.

The outstanding feeling in the mar-  
ket was uncertainty and this was  
reflected in the action of the mar-  
ket which was very irregular.

Traders having recovered somewhat from  
the recent break in prices, they were  
not so well off as those who held their  
stock, as the market was not so good  
as it was on the previous day.

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
