SOFT WEATHER HURT STOCK YARDS' TRADE

Mild Temperature and Congestion of Market Caused Decline in Prices.

MILKERS OF POOR QUALITY

Stockers and Feeders Held Their Own Yesterday as Demand · Was Good.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards on Thursday were 73 car-loads, comprising 458 cattle, 1613 hogs, 106 sheep and lambs, 42 calves and 547 106 sheep and lambs, 42 calves and 547 horses.

Butchers' cattle—It would have been better for trade had there been no fresh cattle on the market yesterday. The numbers arriving on the market during the first three days of the week amounted to about 4500, which was quite equal to the demand, as was seen by the competition which took place when 500 more were placed on sale. On the three previous days there had been a fairly active trade, but, the weather having turned soft, caused the buyers to be less keen, the market to open up slow and prices to decline on an average of fully 10c per cwt., and in many instances more. The common and medium classes suffered the most, as there were few good or choice on sale. There was little or no change in the cow and buil prices.
