Smuts Says Foolish Talk of Whites is Putting Ideas Into Heads of Blacks

Pretoria, South Africa, Feb. 23 .-Lieut.-General Jan Christian Smuts. British member of the league of nations commission, in a speech here today referred to native troubles in which he characterized as dangerous.

ABUSE OF CREDIT

U. S. Federal Reserve Board Determined to Exercise Its Full Power.

Washington, Feb. 23.—Determination of the federal reserve board to exert the full power of the reserve banking system in regulating and controlling the credit situation—a course designed to aid commerce and industry in restoring a pre-war equilibrium—was disclosed in the board's annual report, made public today.
Recommendations also were made to

An ascending scale of rates would be provided in event money was borrowed above the maximum line.
