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DECORATION DAY ATTEMPTED BURGLARY

Members of the A. O. H. Will Visit the Cemeteries Tomorrow.

Tomorrow will be decoration day for the A. O. H. At 1:30 p. m. the procession will leave the society's rooms, on King street, for the Catholic cemeteries, and will be headed by bouquets containing the flowers, and will be accompanied by the City Cornet band.

After decorating the graves there, all will go to the new Catholic cemetery by the Industrial school road, and on the completion of the work will return to the city by the new cemetery road.

At the new cemetery the graves of the late Bishop Sweeney will be decorated. On the way to and from the cemeteries the band will play Irish music.

The flowers will be distributed by the president of Division No. 1 to two or three members and they, escorted by two Hibernian Knights, will go to the different graves and place the decorations, which will be flowers, a pot of shamrock, and an Irish flag to designate the grave.

When the decorating knights have reported back to the president, W. L. Williams, that all the graves have been decorated, all the knights and members will kneel and recite prayers for the repose of the souls of the deceased members.
