ROXTON POND.

We have carried with us the Word of Life, and have scattered it as the incorruptible seed of the kingdom wherever we had an opportunity. We have gathered some fruit, but much of the seed is still hid in the soil, and we are watching its germination, and praying for the heavenly dew. As ever, the enemy has sown his tares, which we see are growing more or less rankly with the good seed. We endeavour to point out to the people the difference between the seed of the kingdom and the tares of the enemy, and then to leave the result with the Lord of the harvest.

Our school progresses, but in the midst of many difficulties. It becomes every day more and more apparent, that the Scriptural and liberal education of the youth is one of the main instrumentalities by which the power of papalism is to be broken in this country. Would that we could obtain all needed help in this particular, so that our school might be soon in full and vigorous operation.

Many of our neighbours are dissatisfied with the teachings of the priests, and are looking to us for that which is better. Two men, heads of families, have left papalism during the year, and many others are separated in spirit, but fear to take the final step. The Lord hears prayer, and He will bring them to the light. We have lost two faithful members by death, one of whom we have very much missed from our prayer-meetings. We have seven regular preaching places in which are many attentive hearers, and a large number of young people. They have contributed towards the support of their Missionary, and to Foreign Missions, \$35 29. We have taken in 16 new members; but as 2 have died during the year our increase is only 14. Our membership is now 41.
