MADE FOR EXHIBITIONS

Fredericton And Chatham Applications—St. Jehn Brewers' Delegation Before Government

Fredericton, N. B., May 81—A large delegation representing the Retail Merchants' Association and citizens in general waited upon the provincial government this morning and asked for the customary grant for the biennial exhibition in this city.

Premier Foster said the province had many demands for financial assistance and it was hardly likely that all could be met. This request would receive careful consideration and if the government could find any method by which it could be acceded to it would take action. Other prominent merchants of Fredericton have informed the government that in the opinion of many citizens circumstances are not favorable to an exhibition. The campaign for greater production, inaugurated by the agricultural department was according to intention, to be assisted by the money usually given as exhibition grants. This makes it all the more unlikely that any grants to exhibitions will be given.


