

MUCH INTEREST IN COUNCIL MEETING

The Main Street Paving Matter Will be Dealt With This Afternoon—Contractors Said to be Willing to Make Changes

This afternoon's meeting of the common council summoned by Mayor Frink, as the result of the resignation of Aldermen Jones Willett, Baxter, Hayes and White, to take up the matter of the Main street paving, is occasioning much interest and a little speculation. It is understood that as a result of the agitation for an investigation the Haasam Company have expressed a willingness to have the specifications changed to the end that the hand method on the concrete may substitute the present method, providing that other modifications are made also, as it is claimed for the company that their contention is that such a change will retard the work and consequently prevent them completing the contract in the specified time.

The Haasam people, it has been said, will claim that they are making little or nothing on the North End contract and took it more as an advertisement. Just what form the meeting will take, it is of course difficult to forecast. The Mayor will state for what purpose it has been called, and his authority for doing so. Aldermen, who as the result of his resolution in the matter, has taken a prominent part in the move for an investigation, will probably be heard from as to his object in having the affair taken up by the council. As there have been numerous complaints from various directions regarding the departing from specifications, and suggesting methods and a lot of other things, these people will probably be given an opportunity of airing their views.

SAYS POLICE TREAT THE COACHMEN LIKE DOGS

Daniel Mullin, K. C. Pays His Respects to the Police in the Matter of Complaints Against Four Drivers

While acting this morning on behalf of four coachmen in a case against the St. John police court, Daniel Mullin, K. C., commented strongly on the methods of the police in reporting the hackmen, saying that they were odious and used the cabmen as though they were dogs, just because they were protected by being clothed in uniforms. The police were making life miserable for the coachmen, in bothering with such petty cases, and he thought they should show more discretion and sense.

The case against the coachmen, Jacob and Melvin Colwell, James McArthur and Wilbur Murphy, was postponed until Judge Ritchie can view the stand allotted to them at the E. S. S. pier, which Mr. Mullin claimed was not so placed as to restrict the coachmen under the by-law, and which was really useless under present conditions.

Policeman McCullum gave evidence this morning in connection with the report, against the men. He was asked why five names did not appear on the report, the addition being that of Andrew Watson, and replied that he had become confused in distinguishing Melvin Colwell from Watson, and in this way there was no necessity of making a further report.

MAIN STREET PAVING

St. John, Aug. 8, 1910.

Sir—On July 19th, 1910, the undersigned stood and watched the "Haasam Paving Company," lay the foundation on Main street. Ninety-two (92) feet long by nineteen (19) feet wide at one end, and Twenty-One (21) feet at the other, and use for this 54 bags of cement, which is the same as thirteen (13) 1/2 barrels of cement.

Had this material been of the best possible selected, and laid according to the concrete specifications, it would have taken at least thirty (30) barrels to have done the work required, and with very open material as shown on the King square fountain, it would have taken at least thirty-nine (39) barrels.
