### SOME LIGHT SHED ON QUEBEC CHANGE

Total Votes Cast Were Given as  
Majorities in Bon-  
aventure

MONTREAL, Nov. 3.—A little light  
was cast on the turnover in Bonaven-  
ture county where a considerable ma-  
jority previously reported for Hon.  
Charles Maclellan, by the publication  
of the federal elections, has been turned  
into a deficit which latest reports puts  
at 22 in favor of his Conservative op-  
ponent, Major The Honourable J. H.  
Kelly, of New Carlisle, a member  
of the Quebec legislative council,  
this evening.

"Since these reports were received,"  
said Hon. Mr. Kelly, "it has been ascer-  
tained that in some cases that apply  
equally to both candidates errors were  
made in giving as majorities the total  
number of votes received by each can-  
didate."

### LIBERAL OVER 30 YEARS.

Mr. Kelly was of the opinion, how-  
ever, that these mistakes were not suf-  
ficient to place the election on the doubt-  
ful list. With regard to the general  
attitude of the electors of Bonaven-  
ture towards political questions, Mr.  
Kelly said that Bonaventure had been  
a Liberal stronghold for over 34 years.  
"The main cause of the change in the  
Liberal majority on this occasion,  
however," he said, "was due to local  
causes."

### 81 STUDENTS FINED

TORONTO, Nov. 3.—Eighty-one  
University of Toronto students have  
each been fined five dollars by the  
university authorities for their par-  
ticipation in a raid on Trinity Col-  
lege residence, during which several  
clergymen visiting the college were  
driven from their beds by a stream  
of water from hose pipes in the  
hands of the students.

### MISS E. DRISCOLL WINS FINE MEDAL

Passes Hard Test at Quebec  
With Only Few Hours  
Notice

To have successfully passed the  
official test of the Royal Life Saving  
Society with only a few hours notice,  
is the proud distinction won at Que-  
bec City recently by Miss Edna Dis-  
coll, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James  
L. Driscoll, of West Saint John. She  
was probably one of the strictest  
demanded in aquatics and calling for  
more than ordinary swimming ability,  
was held recently under the auspices  
of the Royal Life Saving Society,  
Province of Quebec Branch, in the  
large and spacious tank of the Y. W.  
C. A. in Quebec.

Miss Driscoll had been in the big  
tank late the previous afternoon,  
when she accidentally heard of the  
test on the following day. Taking a  
friend into confidence she secured  
the necessary data required in the  
test and going home that evening she  
read through the 41 questions, any  
ten of which she might be asked the  
next day, previous to the strenuous  
test the contestants would be put  
through in the water. The latter in-  
cluded seven different holds, as well  
as a general display of swimming,  
diving, tricks, etc. Out of the 30 who  
took the test 17 qualified and 10  
were awarded the certificate entitling  
them to possession of the bronze  
medallion of the Royal Life Saving  
Society, which will be forwarded  
shortly from England. The test last-  
ed 3 hours and 55 minutes.

## AIR MESSAGES TO BE SENT TO ARCTIC

OTTAWA, Nov. 3.—Arrangements  
for special radio messages, including  
Christmas and New Year greetings to  
mounted police posts in the Arctic,  
have been made by the radio branch  
of the department of Marine and Fish-  
eries.

The Westinghouse Company's broad-  
casting station at Pittsburgh will carry  
transmissions addressed to the Royal  
Canadian Mounted Police at 10 p.m.  
Eastern Standard time, November 21,  
December 31, January 16, and Febru-  
ary 20.

The wave lengths to be used will be  
300 metres, and 44 metres, both trans-  
missions being made simultaneously on  
these wave lengths. With the excep-  
tion of Inspector Wilcox, who is at  
Pond's Inlet, and will have 64 metres,  
all posts will be on 300 metres. Official  
business and special messages will be  
conveyed at these times.

## Fifty or More On Berengaria Hurt In Storm

CHERBOURG, France, Nov. 3.—  
Fifty or more passengers land-  
ed from the steamship Berengaria  
today with bandaged heads, arms  
in splints or sprained legs. They  
had received these injuries on the  
voyage from New York in the  
most terrific storm, in the cap-  
tain's estimation, the ship had  
ever encountered in her ocean ca-  
reer.

### The tempest struck the Beren-

garia last Saturday and lasted  
twenty-four hours.

### FOX HUNTING BANNED.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The whole of  
Leicestershire, has been placed under  
the ban for fox hunting on account of  
the foot and mouth disease. The  
Prince of Wales consequently is hav-  
ing his hunting hounds at Melton-Mow-  
bray, removed to the hunting fields in  
the southern counties.

### TO RESUME DEPT PARLEY.

PARIS, Nov. 3.—The new Paintre  
government in its declaration of policy  
to parliament says it will "resolutely"

peruse, with determination to succeed,  
the negotiations with the allies begun  
in London and Washington by the pre-  
ceding government with a view to set-  
tlement of the debts."

## Biggar Rules Nelson Voters Disfranchised

WINNIPEG, Nov. 3.—Residents  
in seven sub-divisions of the  
Nelson, Man., constituency who  
were unable to vote in the federal  
elections because of the non-arrival  
of ballots in time, are disfranchised  
as far as taking any part in the  
vote electing Canada's fifteenth  
parliament goes. This is the ruling  
made by Col. Biggar, chief electoral  
officer, Ottawa.

## Merchants Try To Prevent Peddling

MONTREAL, Nov. 3.—It was learned  
this morning that the Retail Mer-  
chants' Association intends to ask the  
City Council to discontinue the issuance  
of licenses to peddlers with a view to  
eliminating their trade.

The association believes that it has  
the support of the public, and states  
that the house to house method of  
salesmanship is unsatisfactory and de-  
structive to legitimate retail trade in  
general.

## PASTORS' WIVES ORGANIZE.

TORONTO, Nov. 3.—To promote,  
renew and strengthen friendships,  
wives of ministers of the United Church  
of Canada have formed an association.  
The new organization will include  
members of the Presbyterian and Meth-  
odist Ministers' Wives Association, and  
the wives of Congregational ministers  
not previously linked with any society.

## \$10 A BARREL FOR SPUDS EXPECTED

Northern Maine Talks Nothing  
But Tubers as Buyers Swarm  
Country

BANGOR, Me., Nov. 3.—With the  
county swarming with buyers loaded  
with cash nothing but potatoes is the  
talk just now in Northern Maine. With  
the steady climb in the prices since  
digging time, with reports showing a  
shortage elsewhere many of the farm-  
ers are holding back for still higher  
prices and the \$10 a barrel spud is  
confidently predicted.  
Green Mountains sold at \$6.50 to \$7,  
bulk barrel measure, here today with  
even higher prices reported in other  
places, while fancy seed stock seems  
to be taken for almost any price the  
growers ask. There are not many bank  
or payroll holdups in the county, but  
numerous cases of potato thieves have  
been reported.  
Potatoes are now worth stealing and  
easy to conceal or sell, once made off  
with.

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
