CASE OF YOUNG MAN

SAIL FROM HERE TODAY FOR ROME

St. John People Amongst the Passengers on Corsican. Will Attend Eucharistic Congress—Many Church Dignitaries Included in the Party—Empress Away Tomorrow.

Prominent among a large number of Canadians who will leave St. John today on the Canadian Pacific "Corsican" are Dr. Victor Morin, President Royal Society of Canada; Professor J. B. Lagace, M. A., Montreal; Norbert Delella, former senator and director-general of the French-Canadian Artisans Society of Woonsocket, R. I.; P. O. Tremblay, honorary curator of the Chateau de Ramezay of Montreal. Also on board the Corsican will be about eighty passengers including some from this city, who are on their way to Rome to be present during the sessions of the Eucharistic Congress, which will take place there next month. The pilgrimage is under the direction of Thomas Cook & Son, and besides the Rome visit will include a tour through Italy, Germany, France, Belgium and the British Isles.

It will have as spiritual directors Rev. Father E. J. Derive, S. J., editor Canadian Messenger of the Sacred Heart; Rev. Father Joseph Papin Archambault, S. J.; Mgr. S. J. Father Napoleon Paquette, of Marquis, Sask.; Rev. Father John Mireault, of St. Elizabeth, Man.; Rev. Father A. J. Trudel, of Lunenburg, N. S.; Rev. Father J. B. Bernier, of Lauzon, Que.; Rt. Rev. J. M. Emard, Valleyfield, Que., and Rev. Noel Gosselin, O. F. M.

AN IMPORTANT HEALTH MEASURE

Government Passes Regulation Regarding Treatment of Eyes at Birth—Public Works Minister on Opening Roads for Traffic.

Routine matters occupied the attention of the N. B. government during the greater part of the opening session of a meeting which is being held here today. A regulation of the health department was passed requiring physicians, nurses and midwives to install solution silver in the eyes of babies at birth to prevent blindness. Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, the minister of health, explained that fifty per cent of blindness occurring during birth was due to infection and it was to combat this that the regulation was passed. The practice was already being carried out by a large percentage of doctors. He announced that the department of health would supply physicians and others attending birth with the preparation.

Road Precautions.

Asked after the meeting what his plans were in connection with the opening of the roads to vehicular traffic, Hon. P. J. Veniot, minister of public works, said he had the matter under consideration and would decide to the raising of the closed restrictions on some sections of the roads in St. John county. He said there were some of the roads in the province not yet in a fit state for automobile traffic, but there were some in this vicinity which might be all right for travel. He mentioned the Golden Grove road, the Manawagish road, the Westfield road and the road to Red Head and Mispec.

POLICE COURT.

One man, charged with drunkenness, was remanded to jail.

Frank Guthrie, charged with lying and jacking about the property of the C. N. R. and not giving a satisfactory account of himself, pleaded not guilty. C. N. R. Policeman Morrissey testified that he saw the accused this morning about 1.15 o'clock in the waiting room at the station, asleep. He put him out and told him to go home but, later, about 2 o'clock, he saw him asleep in one of the first class cars. The accused told him he lived in St. Patrick street. He was remanded.
