

FARMERS WILL NOT STRIKE

But If They Raise Smaller Crops Only Lack of Help Will Be to Blame.

"Land of Goshen!" exclaimed the farmer's wife, peering out of the window. "Here it is, 'most six o'clock, and John ain't out of bed yet! What's the matter with ye?" And she shook the inanimate form of her spouse.

"Le me alone!" rejoined the agriculturalist. "I ain't working today. I'm like the coal miners and the carpenters—I'm on strike. The city fella's may make a lot of money and get rich quick, but wait till they go without their food for a while and see how they like it!"

In this striking dialogue the Chicago News pictures the situation conjured up by the threat of a farmers' strike. Arthur C. Page, editor of the Orange Judd Farmer, of that city, denies the existence of such a state of affairs.

"The suggestion of a farmers' strike now is an absurdity," said Mr. Page. "The better and more substantial class of farmers are violently opposed to any such action. The farmers, who are always the hardest hit by strikes in other branches of industry, such as the coal strike, railroad strike and the like, are continually urging anti-strike legislation."

"The whole trouble is that other branches of labor are getting all out of proportion to farming. It is a condition, not a concerted action, and it has been in existence since the start of the war."

"When the national army began to assemble and the cantonments were erected farm hands found that they could make much more money as carpenters than as farmers and work much less. In southern Illinois the coal mines attract boys born on the farm, with shorter hours and higher pay."

Right now if a man came to me and wanted farm work I could get him 500 jobs at \$75 a month inside of an hour."

"That's the whole trouble—there is no farm help, and a farmer and his wife can't look after a whole farm."

"During the war, with the men away, farmers exerted themselves to the utmost at the call of the government. Each one did the work of many men."

"I've seen them come in at night and fall asleep on the kitchen floor from sheer exhaustion. They don't want to see affairs to continue."

"If they cannot get help they will merely raise clover on hand that they never bore wheat and decrease their production in other ways."

ALFRED NOYES ON EUROPEAN AFFAIRS
