DUKE OF DEVONSHIRE OPENS BYRON "T.B." SAN.

Splendid Equipment And Excellent Location Provide Ideal Conditions For Quick Recovery

The new hospital for returned tuberculous soldiers erected by the Military Hospitals Commission on the property of the Queen Alexandra Sanatorium at Byron was formally opened by His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire who presided over the opening ceremony. The building is a model of modern architecture and is equipped with the latest methods and excellent facilities for treatment of the scourge which soon will be wiped out.

The location of the sanatorium is ideal. The buildings stand on the bank of the Thames, five miles west of London, just beyond Spring Bank Park. The Military Hospitals Commission added four pavilions to the buildings already established to meet the demands of the increasing number of tuberculous cases among the soldiers returning.

W. R. REEK OFFICER OF NEW LIVESOCK UNION

Toronto, Feb. 8—A new organization among livestock men has come into existence for the purpose of having some representative body of the producers to handle all questions affecting their interests. A conference of delegates from all the breed societies was held here today under the chairmanship of William Smith, M.P., to form such an eastern livestock union, similar to the one now in existence in the United States.

TO USE LESS SUGAR

Ottawa, Feb. 8—Representative manufacturers wholesalers and retailers in the province of Ontario dealing in chocolate, confectionery biscuits and ice cream have pledged themselves to make such readjustment in their business as may be necessary to effect a reduction in the consumption of cane sugar. A statement signed by some fifty of such dealers, including all the larger concerns, has been sent to the food controller.

Washington, Feb. 8—On a report from General Pershing that aviation was an extra hazardous service, Secretary of War Baker today submitted to the senate a bill to deny the aviators all extra pay allowances in the aviation service, averaging about fifty per cent.

WAS PRISONER ON FAMOUS RAIDER

Halifax, N. S., Feb. 8—In Halifax yesterday was Captain Peter Ottesen, a native of Copenhagen, Denmark, who was a prisoner on board the famous German raider, Moewe, and who is now on his way back to Newfoundland, where he has made his home for many years past. Captain Ottesen has just come from Gibraltar where he met with serious accident as a result of which he is now partially deaf.

Captain Ottesen has crossed the ocean many times since the outbreak of the war. Last winter he was master of the three-masted schooner Duchess of Cornwall, which left St. John's for Europe with a cargo of codfish. Four days after leaving Burgeo the vessel heading for the coast of Newfoundland, where he had made his home for many years past.
