PINERO'S NEW PLAY

The Mind-The-Paint Girl Master-
piece of Stage Craft Yet Hissed
By Part of Audience on Open-
ing Night

(Times' Special Correspondence)

London, Feb. 24.—Sir Arthur Pinero's very experienced tempter to tackle subjects that any ordinary dramatist would find too difficult, and while he has the satisfaction, usually, of a technical triumph, he has not made a pronounced popular success since "His House in Order," because the public did not care much for the characters Sir Arthur chose to present. They were always interesting, but not sufficiently agreeable to most tastes. The evening spent in their company altogether pleasant.

His new comedy "The Mind-the-Paint Girl" suffers less from this perversion than the other recent Pinero plays and is if possible even more brilliantly mastered in construction; yet it was heartily booed and hissed by a part of the first-night audience—the independent folk in the gallery who want vice and virtue spelled with large V's and kept in strict antagonism.

As soon as it becomes apparent, at the rise of the curtain, that the Mind-the-Paint Girl is to deal with an affair between a young lord and a fascinating musical comedy star, the expectation of the conventional theatre-goer is that Good and Bad shall go at it, hammer and tongs. All honor to the playwright, however, for to take so commonplace a subject and apply all his art to showing that it can be treated without the least hint of burlesque or degradation supposed to be necessary to get it "across the footlights," although knowing by experience that the dramatist who dares to do this is liable to be hissed by a large V's and kept in strict antagonism.

It was Lily Partridge's musical comedy song "Mind-the-Paint," that had made her just such a popular idol in London as Edna May became with her "Follow My Song in 'The Belle of New York.'"

"Mind the paint! Mind the paint!
A girl is not a sinner just because she's
not a saint!
But my heart shall hold you dearest—
You may come a little nearer—
If you'll only mind the paint—mind the paint!"

That is the burden of the song with which Lily had caught the guileless public before the play opened; and that is the burden of the play, too.

Lily is drawn with unerring fidelity. She is "straight"—good-hearted, reasonable, lovely as played by Marie Lohr, slangy, and spoiled. Refinement slips away from her when she loses her head, and she comes like her mother, who drops her h's. Naturally when a quite charming young lord, as different as she is from the conventional stage-dope peer, falls in love with her, her people do what they can to get her to break off the sentimental romance.

It is all done with that consummate stagecraft that makes every episode serve the purpose of being interesting in itself and of contributing directly to the forward of the main current of the story. Lily, every effect has its visible and logical cause. That sounds simple enough, but the writer, whose unhappy lot it has been to read many hundreds of manuscript plays in a position to testify that not one in a hundred manages to achieve it.
