### ARE AGAINST LEMIEUX ACT

Trades and Labor Congress Want Repeal—Closing of Federation Convention

Guelph, Ont., Sept. 13.—This has been the busiest day of the Trades and Labor Congress, three sessions being held, at which the time was divided between the adoption of resolutions, a protest from French Canadians against a report in a Toronto paper that they placed racial considerations before the cause, and a discussion of the Lemieux Act. The whole afternoon was spent in a discussion on the latter question, the congress going into committee of the whole with Sir George Asquith, who is here from London, enquiring into the workings of the labor laws in Canada. The adoption in committee of a resolution endorsing the action of the Calgary convention last year asking for the repeal of what is generally known as the Lemieux Act. This was adopted unanimously. There were a number of points brought out in the discussion, the removal of the right to strike and complaints at the manner in which the act had been administered being the chief arguments against it.

There was a spirited discussion over a resolution to do away with private police by powerful corporations, and the government will be asked to pass a law prohibiting the employment of such men. Three lives, Que., Sept. 13.—The resolution passed at the closing session of the Canadian Federation of Labor this morning included the following:

A decision to publish an official organ; a petition to the dominion government to restrict the hours of labor for young girls to 55 hours a week.

The following officers were elected: John Moffatt, president; George Vepper, secretary; G. Marcure, secretary-treasurer; C. A. Laroche, Edward Pepin and the officers, executive committee.

The choice of next year's meeting place, left to the executive committee.
