His Excellency the Governor, having given assent to an Act respecting certain changes in the hours of the day and night to be cited as "The Daylight Saving Act 1917," the public are hereby notified that, under the provisions of the said Act, on the evening of Sunday, 10th June, at nine o'clock, all clocks are to be put on to ten o'clock, and time thereafter will continue as at present from day to day until the last Sunday in September next. This shall be known as "Newfoundland Time," and shall be applicable to the whole colony.

NEWFOUNDLAND POSTAL TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Casco, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.40.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radius of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray. Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

Fatal Accident

Young Man Killed

A message from New Glasgow, N. S., received here on Thursday, conveyed the sad intelligence that George William Bradbury, son of George and Louisa Bradbury, Coley's Point, had been accidentally killed.

Particulars of his death are unknown. He left Sydney, N. S., about 2 weeks ago, and it is thought he was working either in a munitions factory or a sawmill when he met his death. He leaves a wife, mother, father and brothers and sisters to mourn their sad loss.

Boy Badly Injured

Gordon Bishop, little son of George and Mary Bishop, Bishop's Beach, Bay Roberts East, met with a very bad and painful accident on Thursday afternoon by falling over a cliff. Both arms were broken and one of his eyes was badly injured when he fell. One arm was so badly injured that it had to be amputated at the wrist. Dr. McLeod attended to the boy's injuries. The father, we learn, was out on the fishing grounds hauling his trap when the accident to his child occurred.

Letter From Herbert Belbin

Prisoner of War in Germany

Reserve Lazarett Bergkaserne,
Munster i. W.

Dear Mother,—Just a word to let you know that I am in Germany, a prisoner of war. I was captured on April 14th. We are treated good. Don't worry about me. I was slightly wounded in the left arm, just a flesh wound, and it is healing up fine, and I will be all right in a week's time. There was quite a few of our boys taken, I don't know how many. I haven't much news to tell you because we don't hear any.

Remember me to Flora and father and all the family. I will write as often as I can, and that will be pretty often. You can send me parcels through the Red Cross, that is the only way that I can get them from you. From your loving son,

[The above letter was received on Thursday by Mrs. Wm. Belbin, Country Road, from her son, Herbert, who was taken prisoner by the Germans at Monchy, France, on April 14th. The envelope will be an interesting souvenir in itself. On the upper right hand corner is printed the word "Kriegsgefangenen-Liste." The Germans, like the Russians, are not very particular when it comes to spelling a word.—Editor.]

Published by Authority

For the information of persons belonging to Newfoundland who propose to go to the United States of America, notice is hereby given that the Immigration Laws of the United States, which came into effect on the first May last, provide:

1.—That all aliens entering the United States shall pay a tax of \$2, but children under sixteen years of age, accompanying their father or their mother, shall not be subject to such tax. In the case of persons remaining sixty days in the United States, the said tax will be returned upon their leaving the country.

2.—All aliens over sixteen years of age, who cannot read the English language, or some other language, will not be permitted to enter.

3.—Amongst other classes of aliens not admitted into the United States are the following:—Idiots, insane, epileptic, paupers, those physically defective and children under sixteen who are unaccompanied.

Cases have been brought to the notice of the Government where Newfoundlanders for one or other of the above reasons have been refused admission to the United States, and much disappointment and inconvenience, as well as expense, has been the result.

Public Notice

The attention of the Public is called to Section 32 of the Post Office Act, 1891, which provides that the P. M. General has the sole and exclusive privilege of conveying, receiving, collecting, sending and delivering of letters within and from Newfoundland. It is therefore unlawful for letters to be handed to passengers or conveyed by passengers clear of the Post Office, and any person may, and every person employed in the Post Office service shall seize any letters so unlawfully collected, sent or delivered in violation of the Act, and take them to the nearest post office and give such information to the Postmaster as he is able to give and is necessary for the effectual prosecution of the offender.

Newfoundland Patriotic Association Employment Committee

The Employment Committee has been appointed by the Newfoundland Patriotic Association "to take into consideration applications for employment in civil life from returned Soldiers and Sailors of the Newfoundland Regiment and Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve who have been granted honourable discharges." The Committee can only perform this duty to our returned soldiers and sailors with the fullest help and co-operation of all those in the Colony who employ labour or require help or service of any kind in which these men may be employed. The Committee will prepare and keep on file a register of all men seeking employment, giving their age, qualifications and experience, so far as possible, of each applicant. This information will be available to prospective employers, and steps will be taken to bring about interview or correspondence between employers and soldier or sailor applicants. Every person or firm when requiring such help for either domestic or business purposes is therefore invited to communicate to the Committee the nature of the help required, and of the work to be done, and such other information as may be useful.

For the present the Headquarters of the Committee are at the Colonial Building, St. John's, and communications should be addressed to A. E. Parsons, Secretary of the Employment Committee.


