I regret very much that all the numerals could not be treated with the same degree of distinction. Number 7 has, however, no reason to complain, since it is in possession of half a dozen of them, though for a singular reason, it keeps only one in sight.

There are many persons tolerably good at remembering names, words, facts, and other things, but whose faculties for the recollection of dates are far less keen. To such persons the following plan of system for impressing dates, or any series of figures—indistinct upon the memory may prove very useful.

The principle upon which the plan I have to propose is founded, consists in having the ten digits used to express numbers represented by certain letters of the alphabet, the same letters always representing the same figures.

To those, apart from the privileged class mentioned, who might object that it is no more easy to retain the representative words or syllables than the numbers themselves, or might raise other objections to the system, I would say: Give it a fair trial, and I am confident the result will be favorable to it, and will lead to its adoption.

I would recommend it particularly for ensuring the recollection of numbers, consisting of many figures, which one might wish to retain in the memory. It will be perceived that it is easier to remember, for example, a word composed of eight letters than the eight figures represented by those letters.

Now take any one, but only one—of the numerals in each row, following the order in which the figures are down. String them together so as to form a word. String two or three more syllables easily pronounced.

Proceed in the manner indicated with respect to dates by means of the figures you may desire not to forget, amalgamating the representative syllable in some way of other with a word or name in connection with the number to be remembered if you wish you to do so.

TAKING EFFECT 1st JUNE 1880.

It will be noticed that the sound of nearly all the vowels, as disposed in the key, accords with that of the vowel or diphthong enclosed in the name of the numerals for which they stand.

Each digit can be more readily called by mind by its representative vowel than it would be, for example, were the vowels disposed in their ordinary sequence corresponding to that of the digits, as in the case of Grey's system, and some other mnemonic systems of the kind. Thus the vowel i in pi, pronounced as i in five, will more readily call back to mind that digit than the vowel p, the one which would represent that numeral were the vowels alphabetized. For the same reason, a in at, pronounced as a in eight, will recall that numeral than any other vowel sound.

It is in some way sound as in come or in more, or in four, sounds as in four, with a and a representing the first digit. The consonants e and z are each well adapted to represent 6 and 4, the first two of the alphabet, very properly represent the second digit. Consonant t, with the accompanying vowel e, feels perfectly
