A popular war would cover up an unpopular one and give the Russians an excuse to make peace with Japan or withdraw from Japan's reach and so staunch the bleeding in men and money now going on in Manchuria."
Further, according to the Spectator, military men in Russia believe that war against Great Britain would be conducted in company with Germany and France and present no risks to Russia, as the brunt of the fighting would fall on France and Germany, whose colonies could be taken in event of the British being victorious. With the Russian fiet already sone, Great Britain could not inflict injury on Russia."






