DISPELLING THE FOG BY **ELECTRICAL DISCHARGES**

French Engineer Meets Success in His Experiments in the English

PARIS, Mar. 13.—M. Dibot a French engineer, is at present conducting a series of experiments on the English Channel which have given raise to the hope that New York harbor may ultimately be kept free from fog. Attracted by the English experiments for dispatching fog by means of electrical discharges, M. Dibos conceived the idea of a combination of hertzlan waves. Beneath a powerful Hertzlan plant which emits, waves of 40,000 volts he has placed four huge blowpipes directed to the four points of the compass. Simultaneously with the discharge of the Hertzlan waves the blowpipes, each giving a temperature of 2,000 degrees centigrade were lighted. In from 20 to 30 minutes a thick fog was dispersed over a zone of 200 yards. Encouraged by this success the experiments will be continued.
