News Summary.

DOMINION. —The total duties at Kentville and outports for the fiscal year amounted in all to \$13,425.52.

—The duties paid at the Custom House on the new engines just now imported from the United States, for the Central Railway Company amounted to \$5,000.

—A writ has been issued against the Windsor and Annapolis railway, claiming \$20,000 damages for the death of Dr. Benjamin Fraser, at Windsor, on 4th July, 1888, who was run over by a train.

—The net earnings of the Canadian Pacific Railway for the month of May were \$380,588, being an increase of \$145,547 over the corresponding month of last year.

—The cotton trade of India is growing into importance. The first cotton mill was established in Bombay in 1851.

—The London Canadian Gazette of the 20th June says: In the live stock trade a brisker tone is generally reported, and sales of Dominion stock have been at better prices as a rule.

—Anthracite coal has been advanced in New York 10c. to 15c. a ton. —Pennsylvania has declared against prohibition by a majority of 189,020.

—The future of the Bureau Improvement Company of St. Paul, with \$1,000,000 liabilities, has created a sensation. —A railroad to cost \$130,000,000 is talked of by the people of Washington Territory, to extend from Spokane Falls to Alaska.

—Russia seems to be supplanting the United States in the kerosene oil trade in India. In 1886 we imported over 29,000,000 gallons of petroleum to India.
