

GOV. GENERAL'S STAY WILL BE PROLONGED

Ottawa, Aug. 3.—The Duke of Connaught's term as Governor General is likely to extend to the arrival of the Prince of Teck, if the hasty condition of affairs in Europe continues.

The Duke is scheduled to leave early in October and the Prince to arrive the day following. The traditional means of conveyance for the incoming and outgoing Canadian Governor General is a regular passenger liner. The Duke of Connaught came to Canada on such a boat. However, with hostile cruisers on the Atlantic neither Canadian nor the British authorities would care to send the Duke of Connaught nor the Prince of Teck across the Atlantic on anything less secure than a first class battleship. These crafts are likely to be wanted for other purposes during the next few months.

He is survived by a widow, three sons, and four daughters, James McAdam and Mrs. Joseph Hollans of this place, David McAdam of St. John, and William McAdam, of Westmead, N. H. Mr. McAdam's remains will be interred at the cemetery here.

CZAR WILL FIGHT WHILE ONE OF HIS ENEMY REMAINS ON RUSSIAN SOIL

London, Aug. 3.—The German fleet in Kiel Harbor is reported to have been bottled up today. Wireless despatches say that heavy firing was heard in the North Sea last night, indicating that a naval engagement was going on.

The German embassy today denied that two British merchant vessels had been seized. It said that they had changed their destination because of the military operations.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 3.—The capital spent a historic day on Sunday. When it became known that a special service of prayer was to be celebrated at the winter palace, where the Emperor was to show himself to the people, an extraordinary wave of excitement passed over the city.

The Emperor, in a brief speech, expressed the calm dignity with which

Russia had received the declaration of war, and the confidence of the nation that the war would be carried to the desired end.

"I here declare solemnly," the Emperor said, "that I will not make peace while a single soldier of the enemy remains on Russian soil."

Invaders Defeated Twice.

Paris, Aug. 3.—Two defeats of German troops invading France were announced by a news agency here today. It is stated that in one engagement on the frontier a division of Uhlans, the famous cavalry of the Kaiser's army, was routed by French troops and 2,000 prisoners captured. A German patrol that crossed the border near Longwy, was repelled. Two German officers and twenty soldiers were killed.

BOMBARDMENT OF RUSSIAN SEAPORT AT LIBAU REPORTED

Berlin, Aug. 2, via Brussels.—The small cruiser Augsburg has sent the following report to Berlin by wireless:

"Am bombarding the naval harbor at Libau, and am engaged with enemy's cruiser. The naval port of Libau is in flames."

Libau is one of the principal sea-

ports of Russia and is located on the Baltic Sea, one hundred miles or more north of the German coast. It is fortified and is used as an arsenal by the navy.

The German protected cruiser Augsburg is of 4,280 tons displacement and her chief armament consists of twelve 4.1 inch guns. Her crew aggregates about 400 men.

ITALIAN GOVERNMENT IN QUANDARY

Rome, Aug. 3.—The head of the Italian General staff conferred today with the leading Generals and Admirals of the Italian army and fleet as to the Italian plan of campaign in case Italy should be drawn into the European war.

It was pointed out in authoritative circles here that Italy would be in a most critical position if the three powers of the Triple Alliance were brought face to face with those of the Triple Entente. The combined Anglo-French fleet, it was argued, would then have at its mercy the coasts of the Mediterranean and Ionian seas, and it was thought that England would occupy Sicily, while France might seize Sard-

NO DANGER OF COAL FAMINE IN CANADA

Montreal, Aug. 3.—Mr. Alexander Dick, head of the Dominion Coal Company, Montreal, says there is no danger of Canada suffering for want of coal if the United States should cease to supply this country because of Great Britain being at war. "America does not need to supply Canada with coal," said Mr. Dick today. "We have got all the coal we want in Nova Scotia, and could send it as far west as Winnipeg. There is no danger of the west going short either."

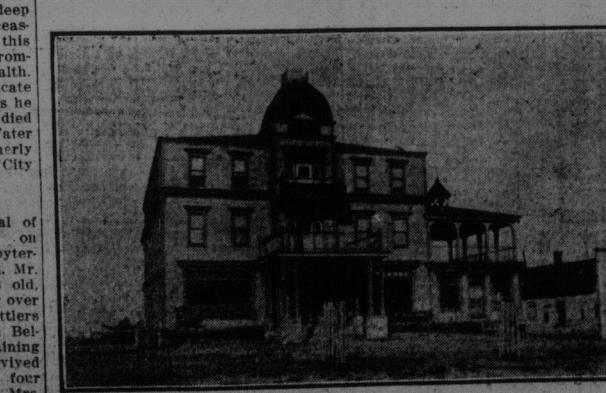

NOTHING FOR ENGLAND TO BE INDIFFERENT

London, Aug. 3.—Special prayers for divine guidance through the crisis were offered at all churches of every denomination yesterday. The Archbishop of Canterbury conducted the service at Buckingham Palace in the morning, which was attended by the king and queen and other members of the royal family.

The Archbishop preached in the afternoon to a crowded congregation, over a thousand people being unable to obtain admittance. The preacher recommended corporate individual prayer and avoidance of all selfish rivalry in the affairs of common life instead of following Christ's precept, "bear ye one another's burdens."

Canon Newbolt preaching at St. Paul's said, "Europe is ablaze and it is no time for England to remain indifferent, honor called her and if she obeyed the call, God would defend the right. Canon Mason preaching at Canterbury Cathedral declared that the Austro-Hungarian policy towards Serbia was one of selfishness without any trace of magnanimity, generosity or even common fairness. If England were involved she would enter on the war with clean hands."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-agent for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not sub-agent), on certain conditions.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$800.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
