RIVER STREET HOUSE
BADLY DAMAGED
Family had narrow escape
in early morning fire.

A tenement house in River street,
owned by Captain John E. Porter, was
completely gutted by fire early yester-
day morning. J. H. Fisher, who lives
in the upper flat, discovered the fire
on getting up, and barely managed to
get his family out before the ceiling
fell in.

Alfred Harity, who lives in the
lower flat, sounded the alarm at 5.40.
The fire department responded, but
owing to the absence of a fire plug it
was six o'clock before connections
were finally made and streams were
played on the flames, which by this
time had gained control of the building.
The fire for the most part was con-
fined to the ceiling and back of the fire
house. Although the origin of the fire
is not known it is supposed that a de-
fective flue was responsible for the
conflagration. Mr. Fisher's loss, which
consists in the destruction of his fur-
niture, is partly covered by insurance,
amounting to \$700.

CANADIAN TROOPS

swick's representative in
England, down to work.

James Glichrist, superintendent of
the Provincial Immigration Depart-
ment, has received a letter from F. W.
Summer, Agent General for New
Brunswick in London, in which he
says he has been to the military camp
at Shorncliffe, and has seen many Can-
adian and New Brunswick soldiers. He
says: "I went down to Shorncliffe
from July 31 to August 4, and met
nearly all the officers of the 26th New
Brunswick Battalion. I also visited
Major McKean's Ammunition Corps at
Newingreen, and Colonel W. H. Har-
rison at Otterpool."

"I saw the review of the Canadians
by Major General Sam Hughes and
Donar Law. They were reviewed in
two sections, one at Beechborough
Park, in which there were about 15,000
men, and the other at Moore's Plain,
in which there were about 14,000. The
26th rank among the best of them. It
seems too bad that so many fine men
are leaving New Brunswick when we
are trying to get emigrants to go out
there. I intend to go down to Folke-
stone sometime within the next two
weeks, and will try to meet all the
New Brunswick men, both officers and
privates."
