

## NEWCASTLE'S HOSPITAL IS UP-TO-DATE

Splendid Institution the Gift of Ernest Hutchinson, of Douglstown—One of Finest in Province.

Newcastle, Aug. 24.—The new Miramichi hospital, of which the corner stone was laid by Mrs. Hugh Moncrieff, daughter of the founder, Ernest Hutchinson, of Douglstown, on July 1st, 1915, and which was formally opened one year later, has been open to patients since the latter part of June last and has at times since been taxed to its capacity. Already plans for extension are being considered. Patients from all over Northumberland county are coming in and also from the neighboring parts of York and elsewhere.

The new hospital has completed its equipment this month by installing, at a cost of \$3,500, an elevator which, as soon as the town inaugurates its promised all day electric service, will be run by electricity.

The hospital is said to be the most up to date in the Maritime Provinces and, except for size, equal to any in Canada.

The cost of construction and equipment, some \$90,000, has been borne entirely by Ernest Hutchinson, the retired lumberman of Douglstown, who shortly previously built a \$12,000 hall in Douglstown and presented it to a board of trustees representing the associated lodges: I. O. F., Rebekah, I. O. O. F., etc., of that village.

Mr. Hutchinson not only supplied the funds for the hospital enterprise, but personally supervised every detail of its building and furnishing, the whole being done by day's work under his immediate supervision.

The building is of Miramichi sandstone and has a frontage of 144 feet with an average width, exclusive of verandahs, of forty feet. It is of three stories besides a full-sized basement, eleven feet one inch from floor to ceiling. Its furniture is of the best that could be procured and the sanitary arrangements are perfect. There is a Wappler X-ray machine with all the latest appliances. The sterilizer is a Bramhall Deane. The kitchen, staffs, dining room, X-ray and dark room, emergency room, boiler and fuel rooms, laundry, janitor's apartments, etc., are in the basement. The partitions and ceiling are all fire-proof.

The ground floor contains two public wards, male medical and female medical. These wards are each 24x28 ft. with twelve foot ceilings, and contain six beds each. On this floor, to the right of the staircase and elevator, are the main office and the board of trustees' office, while to the left are the general waiting room and the nurses' parlor. Just across the hall is the matron's private room. The corridors are the full length of the central part of the building, and are divided from the wards by brick fire walls with self-closing fire doors, thus making three distinct compartments on each floor. In case of fire one may easily be closed from the other.

The second floor contains two public wards exactly like those on the ground floor, but which will be used as male and female surgical. On this floor, also, there are seven private rooms, each fitted with private baths and fire places.

All of these rooms have easy access to spacious verandahs, two stories in height, each floor being 16x23 ft., and overlooking the river.

The third floor is the home of the nurses, and contains the operating department. This department has all the latest conveniences and appliances, sterilizing and anesthetic rooms, etc. The operating room, and the many bath rooms and toilets are fitted up with petrosilo floors and walls.

The doctors' room has a shower bath and steel lockers. There are two fire escapes, one at each end, running from top story to the ground. There is an observatory on the roof of the building.

The plumbing and fixtures throughout are of the latest hospital patterns and the most sanitary possible.

The hospital is lighted by electricity, and is also fitted with the latest electric call system, by which nurses may be summoned day or night without the least exertion or disturbance of the patient. There is also a complete inter-telephone system, giving connection between any one room and all the rest.

The architect was J. Leonard Heans of St. John, and the superintendent of construction was John Edgett of Winnipeg, who built the three hospitals on Partridge Island, the Kingston Consolidated School, the Woodstock Court House, etc., etc.

## PROVINCIAL PROHIBITION ACT ENDORSED

Temperance Workers of Eastern Queens and Northfield Approve Government Measure and Vote to Repeal Scott Act.

Chipman, N. B., Aug. 21.—A very successful convention of the Temperance Workers of Eastern Queens county and the Parish of Northfield, Sunbury county, was held this afternoon in King's Hall, and was attended by delegates representing different churches and other organizations. Mr. Isaac Baird was elected chairman and Harry King secretary. Rev. W. D. Wilson, field secretary of the Dominion Alliance, explained the new Provincial Prohibition Act thoroughly, and after considerable discussion it was unanimously resolved "that in the opinion of this convention the new law is far superior to the Scott Act, and that steps be taken to have the latter act repealed so that the Provincial law may come in force."

An auxiliary of the Dominion Alliance was then organized, the following officers being elected: President—W. B. Evans, Rothwell. Vice-president—Daniel Wilson, Cambridge.

In the evening a public meeting was held, being opened with prayer by Rev. E. E. Durkee, and addresses were given by Rev. E. E. Durkee, Rev. D. Hoyer, Rev. W. D. Wilson, Rev. D. Price, W. B. Evans acted as chairman.

A resolution in favor of the repeal of the Scott Act was unanimously passed. The united choirs of the Presbyterian and Baptist churches furnished appropriate music.

**CONTRACTOR A. E. SMYE SAYS LABOR IS SCARCE**
