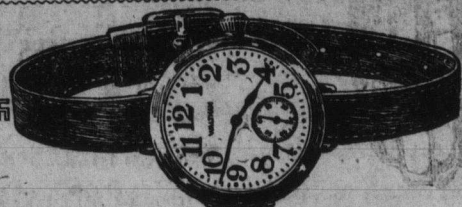

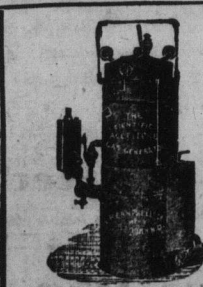

CANADIAN ENGINEERS AND ARTILLERY BACK IN RECRUITING ARENA

Men Wanted for Both Units
—Engineers Will Probably Open Office in City—St. John Boy Honored.

There is every reason to believe that before many days the Canadian Engineers will reopen their recruiting office in the city. It will be recalled here that several weeks ago the authorities issued an order to the different recruiting officers throughout the Dominion, stopping the enlistments in the engineering corps and heavy artillery units. This order, according to advice received at headquarters in the city, has been rescinded, and these units are again granted permission to enter the arena for recruits. The Canadian Engineers, and the heavy artillery are two of the most popular units in the service, and it is expected that the report for this week will be much better than that of last week on account of the new order.

Just what will come to St. John to look after the interest of the Canadian Engineers it is not yet known, but it is expected that a New Brunswick officer will be sent here from St. Johns, Quebec.

Major McMillan Honored.
According to a cable from London Major Alexander McMillan, a St. John boy, has been awarded the Distinguished Service Order. Although no particulars of the incident which warranted the investing of the military honor upon the officer have been received, the many friends of the St. John boy will be pleased to learn that his services have been recognized to such a marked degree.

Mass of Requiem.
At the Cathedral yesterday morning at 8 o'clock, Rev. Wm. M. Duke celebrated a mass of requiem. The service was for the repose of the soul of Private George Cusack, who was recently killed in action in the battlefields of Europe.

Corporal Luck Wounded.
Mr. Charles S. Luck, of Fairville, has received word that his brother, Corp. Alfred G. Luck, who enlisted here with the 26th Battalion, but who has been for some time with the French mortar squad, was wounded in the recent drive. No particulars as to the nature of his wound have yet been received. He is but 29 years of age and enlisted upon his arrival in this country two years ago. He is a native of Kent, England, and has two brothers serving in the navy.

Private J. H. Thomas Killed.
That her husband, Pte. John H. Thomas, had been killed in action on August 19 is the news received by Mrs. Thomas, 89 St. James street. The telegram came from Res. Rapids, N. B., and was sent by Mrs. Craig Mowbray, a sister of the gallant hero, who has made the supreme sacrifice.
Pte. Thomas was a native of Birch Ridge, Victoria Co., and was 28 years of age. He enlisted in February, 1916, with the 15th Battalion, and on June 19, left for Valcartier. Twelve days previous to June 7, he was married to Miss Blanche Martin, a former resident of Hopewell Cape, Albert Co., in the West Canadian church, by the Rev. D. J. MacPherson.

North End Man Wounded.
Mrs. Emma Titus, of 432 Main street, has received word that her husband, Pte. William Titus, who came here from Yarmouth, N. S., to enlist, has been wounded. Pte. Titus enlisted with the Field Ambulance Corps on January 24th, and received his wound on August 25. He has another brother in the service who was wounded about a year ago, and has been in the hospital ever since.

Returned Soldier Appointed.
Lieut. James Inches has been appointed agent in St. Stephen for the Dominion Express Co., in succession to his father, the late Walter W. Inches. The appointment is a very popular one, not only because of the personality of the new agent, but because of the evident intention of his company to give consideration to the returned soldiers who have risked all in their behalf in common with other Canadian institutions.

Moncton Man Wounded.
Private Bert Bass, of Moncton, has been wounded. He is the son of H. L. Bass, learned on Thursday.

From New Brunswick.
The name of E. Barnett, of the Liverpool, died in New Brunswick, appears in a list of wounded in the Imperial forces, issued August 10.
Pte. R. C. Keen Killed.
Fredericton, Aug. 31.—Miss Elsie Keen of North Tay, received official word this morning that her brother, Pte. Ruben Cyril Keen had been killed in action on August 16th. Pte. Keen came to this country from England with his sister, and went to live with Robert Stevenson at North Tay. Two years ago last May he enlisted when he was fifteen years of age and has been at the front practically ever since. A year ago last May he was wounded and after being in hospital, he went back to the trenches and has been there ever since. The brave young soldier survived by one sister and his father, who resides in England. He is the youngest soldier from York Co. to give his life in the present war, and his sister will have the sympathy of many friends in the death of her brother.

A VERDICT OF NOT GUILTY IN MURDER TRIAL

John O'Brien and Everett Carland Were Acquitted by Jury After 45 Minutes' Deliberations—Accused Immediately Discharged.

After three-quarters of an hour deliberation, the jury in the murder case against Everett Carland and John O'Brien, returned a verdict of not guilty at the Circuit Court yesterday afternoon. The jury retired at 8.05 p. m., and returned at 2.50 o'clock, when M. T. Coburn, the foreman, announced that the jury agreed that the prisoners were not guilty as charged. Daniel Mullin, K. C., chief counsel for the accused, made immediate application for the dismissal of the prisoners, and a few moments later both accused walked from the court room free men. It was a dramatic moment when the jury filed into the box from their jury room. Their short absence indicated that an agreement had been reached, and the announcement of an acquittal by the foreman was not a surprise.

Both Messrs. Carland and O'Brien received many congratulations from their friends who were in court, while Mr. Mullin who conducted their case was also heartily congratulated. The family of the accused young men were in court and accompanied the accused to their homes.

John O'Brien was the first of the accused to leave the box. Everett Carland followed a few moments later, after his fine in connection with the manslaughter charge had been adjudged at the police court. The court room was crowded throughout the day, the spectators gradually dispersing after the announcement of the verdict by the jury.

Both counsel completed their addresses to the jury the forenoon session. Mr. Mullin opened shortly after the case was resumed at 10 o'clock. He reviewed the evidence in considerable length, taking up the testimony of the Crown witnesses, and stating that there was nothing whatever produced to connect the prisoners with the crime. He also examined the evidence for the defence, which he stated to show that both Carland and O'Brien were at their homes on the evening that Robert Harris, Jr., was shot. Mr. Mullin made some pointed remarks relative to the administration of the police department and criticized the department for their failure to solve the Williams' murder case. He strongly censured the Master Plumbers' Association, claiming that the whole enterprise was directed against organized labor, which had always been recognized by British justice.

For the Crown, Dr. Wallace pointed out that citizens were entitled to protection and that crime should be prevented. He said that the evidence in this case was circumstantial, but that there was sufficient testimony to call for the serious consideration of the jury, whose duty it was to determine the guilt or innocence of the accused. He reviewed the evidence for the Crown, and for the defence, and stated that it was strange how the memory of witnesses for the defence was keen on some points but poor on other material issues.

Chief Justice McKewen opened his remarks by saying that the case was as usual eminently fair. He said that at the time the jury were prepared to state that the witnesses for the defence were untruthful or mistaken, they would be justified in coming to the decision that the accused were far away from the scene of the murder. The guilt or innocence of the accused, however, rested with the members of the jury. With respect to the testimony of Lenehan and Beattie, relative to seeing the accused, the chief justice stated that the benefit of any reasonable doubt.

J. MacMillan Trueman was assistant Crown counsel, while E. J. Henneberry was the assistant counsel for the defence.
